### WOMEN'S CLUB NOTES.

The following timely article from the pen of Edyth Toizer Wethered, on the subject of woman's relations to fair work is worthy of careful study of every club woman (and her husband), in Oregon:

The woman's department and the details of their work at an exposition require more space than that which has been allotted. Many men, and probably as many women, not being familiar with these matters, really think that a woman's board is just to look after tating, burnt work and sweet pickles. Well, they do take care of the exhibits of woman's handiwork, but is has ceased to be put off in a separate corner for competition between women alone, but merit is merit nowadays—whether in competition with the work of a man or woman.

The question is so frequently asked of me, "If I thought the Lewis and Clark exposition should have or would have a woman's building." The reply is, "Why not ask if there should be or is to be an illumination of the grounds." A woman's board and a woman's building is positively imperative. Every previous exposition management has found the woman's board the foundation and pillar on which rested the success of hospitable and social conditions.

After an exposition has been entirely completed and everything installed there is nothing to do but look at it. In our every day life, whether at our hearth or in a foreign shore, our heart longs for and craves the congeniality of friends. Visitors at an exposition if deserving of special attention must have a home place, where the hand of good-fellowship and a warm welcome is extended.

A woman's building has always been the home shelter where receptions, dainty lunches and elegant banquets are held. Here the leading ladies of the city, state or sister states are assigned certain days or weeks to be on hand to receive the daily visitors, and the husbands, fathers, brothers and friends can with dignity and pride drop in with their gentlemen guests and be received and entertained as at their own firesides. The men's work at an exposition is mostly to arrange, install, maintain and direct the mechanical side, but the social side naturally belongs to women.

There has always been a part of the general appropriation fund set aside for the woman's board, but at Charleston, S. C., the loyal charming woman of the South well realized the many difficulties which confronted the men and therefore made plans by which to aid in every way possible. A public meeting was called, a president and vice-president elected, secretary and treasurer and the various committees appointed. The women determined to raise a fund for the en-

tertainment of prominent guests. They gave excursions, balls, concerts and various other gatherings with which to raise money. Several thousand dollars was the result.

During the exposition hundreds of prominent people were entertained and banqueted. Indeed, some of the most delightful and elaborate receptions ever given in the South were by the woman's board of the Charleston exposition. Every cent for the expense came from the treasury and after the exposition was over they still had two thousand dollars left. This they gave to the men's board to assist in its deficiency. When a reception was to be given the president instructed the floral committee to arrange the decorations. The refreshment committee was given its charge. The music and other details were each left to the respective committee. Thus, with a systematic and practical executiveness every detail was easily directed.

There is indeed, much for the women to do here, and there is not one in this whole Northwest but who will respond to the call when the opportune time arrives for a general organization. We are not to overlook the department of woman's handiwork. No, not for a moment; but the firm foundation for the social, educational and cultured side must be handled and directed in a manner which will win for the Lewis and Clark centennial laurels and lasting favorable commendations.

My personal experience with the exposition work at Omaha, Buffalo and Charleston will gladly be given to the women when they are organized and ready for action, and it is my opinion that we are all needed right now to help in the wiping out of moss-backisms of those who are so shortsighted as not to realize that this exposition will be the grandest and greatest advertisement and reap more marvelous results for the whole Northwest than any other method could possibly achieve in years.—Edyth Toizer Wethered, in Oregon Daily Journal.
