BINGHAM SPRINGS.

Government Land Divided Between
Sheepmen and Cattlemen—Grass
Growing Rapidly.

Isaac Hagen was in the city yester-
day from Bingham Springs, where he
took his cattle—225 head—for sum-
mer range a short time ago, from his
ranch in Despain Canyon.

Mr. Hagen states that all the gen-
eral summer range around Bingham
Springs is government land which
has been surveyed. A little of the
land has been taken by settlers, but
the stockmen claim to be very con-
siderate about the rights of the set-
tlers. Mr. Hagen does not anticipate
any trouble in the neighborhood of
Bingham Springs between the sheep
and cattlemen, the territory being
pretty well divided by agreement,
and everybody showing a disposition
to respect the agreement.

Nearly everyone who has a claim
on the summer range is driving his
cattle into the mountains and hills,
and the sheep will be driven in about
May 1. All the stock is in good con-
dition. During the past three weeks
the hills pasturage developed in fine
shape from the rains and warmth,
but yesterday an inch of snow fell at
Bingham and vicinity. It could hardly
even stop the growth of the grass for
more than a day, however, as it was
expected to be nearly gone by night.

Mr. Hagen is a strong partisan of
the Shorthorn, believing it to be the
very best all-purpose animal. He ad-
vances one argument seldom heard,
but effective if the conclusion is cor-
rect. It is that the Shorthorn type is
the most persistent of all the better
families of improved cattle. For in-
stance, when neglected, it does not re-
vert to the cheaper strains with which
it has been crossed nearly so readily as
the Hereford.

J. F. Thompson, the Athena cattle-
man, has driven his cattle onto the
summer range around Bingham
Springs.

John Narkus, of Bingham Springs,
was in town yesterday. Mr. Narkus
only a few days ago drove his cattle
back onto the summer range, which
he wintered in Greasewood Gulch and
Despain Canyon.

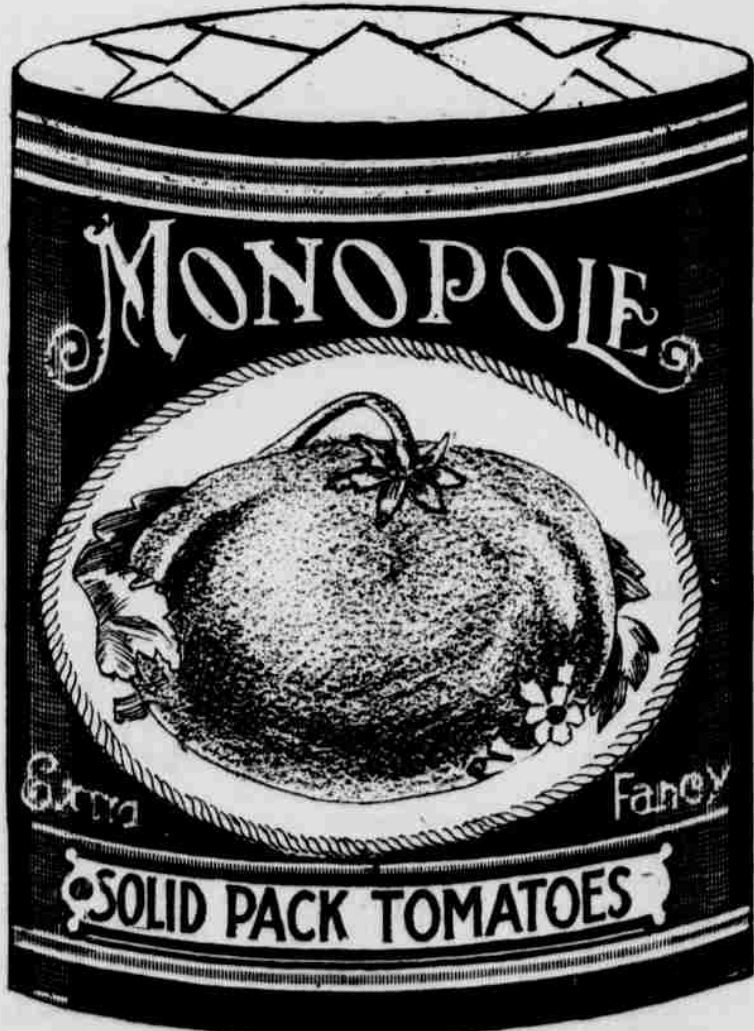
