UMATILLA PRESBYTERIANS.

Much Interest Taken at the Reservation by the Indian Converts. Indians who affiliate with the Presbyterian church came from six to 12 miles last week to take part in the communion services at the Presbyterian mission on the reservation, which were held Sunday, and also in the preparatory services which were held Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The Indians keep in the church anteroom the poles for nine teepees to be used on such occasions and other church observances which require their attention for several days in succession. Five teepees, accommodating some 35 Indians, were erected and used last week. Sunday there were 29 communicants. Rev. J. M. Cornelson reports that the interest has increased this year that ever exhibited before in a long time by the Indian members of the church, and even some non members who have become interested more or less in the work of the mission. Rev. Enoch Pond, of the Nez Percé, who has resided at the mission as Rev. Cornelson's assistant for two years past, may return this spring to his own people, at Kamiah, Idaho.
