Mr. Monterastelli invited him to ride and brought him to Pendleton, where he lost trace of him. The old man was ragged and forlorn to the last degree of respectability or presentability. He claimed to have walked most of the way from Albany and to be on his way into the Palouse country where he has relatives.

He was the embodiment of neglect, poverty and friendlessness. Mr. Monterastelli states that in spite of his outward appearance, he bore no impress of being a tramp or hobo.

TWO EGGS IN ONE DAY.

David Kauffman Finds a Curious Freak in the Way of a Hen Egg.

David Kauffman, of this city, a gentleman 80 years of age and well known in this county for 41 years, has left at the East Oregonian office a real curiosity.

It is a perfectly shaped and proportioned egg an inch and a quarter in length which was taken from an ordinary hen's egg which Mr. Kauffman had boiled for his breakfast. The small egg was in the small end of the larger egg and the yolk of the larger egg was in the large end. The dwarf egg is perfectly normal except in size and that the shell is quite rough. Mr. Kauffman picked up this egg in his orchard, where it was laid by one of his hens.

This is the only authentic case on record in the annals of Pendleton of a hen laying two eggs in one day.

CONCRETE BRICK.

W. F. Matlock's Building on Court Street, to Be on a "Hollow Brick" Foundation.

A detail of the building which W. F. Matlock will build this summer at the northeast corner of Court and Garden streets that will be out of the ordinary, will be the concrete foundation.

This is known as the "hollow brick" material, though the material is neither brick nor is it hollow. Mr. Matlock believes the "hollow brick" concrete work to be just what it is represented to be and will show his faith in it by putting a two-story brick building upon a foundation made of it.

One-half of the first story of the new building will be occupied by the offices of the Electric Lighting and Power Company, and the basement and rear of the premises will be used for storage by the company. Mr. Matlock will occupy the second story as a residence.

It is not yet known who will occupy one-half of the first story. The building will be 50x75 feet in size.

WILL CHOOSE REPRESENTATIVE

High School Pupils to Contest Tomorrow Night for Honor of Going to Interscholastic Meet.

Unusual interest attaches to the high school contest tomorrow night on account of the winner therein being the one who will represent this high school in the interscholastic meet at Walla Walla May 8.

On that occasion 10 or a dozen high schools, academies and colleges will compete which are in the territory between Colfax and Pullman on the north and Baker City on the east.

On the same date, May 8, also at Walla Walla, and under the auspices of Whitman College, will occur an interacademic athletic meet which will be participated in by representatives of probably all the institutions represented in the debate.

Another very interesting feature of the double bill presented at Walla Walla is that Whitman College will entertain both the athletics and the orators.

Negro Woman on Trial.

This afternoon there is in progress in Judge Fitz Gerald's court the trial of Josie Fields, colored, charged with disorderly conduct. Josie is the proprietress of a "place" in the tenderloin. Her ballawick has been the scene of so many rows and disturbances that it has been impossible for the police to keep the peace for more than 15 minutes at a time therein. So Josie was ordered out of town. She neglects and refuses to go and made up her mind to stand the city a fight in its efforts to get rid of her. Hence the trial now in progress.

Professor Hawes Acquitted.

The jury in the case of the state vs. Professor Hawes, of Athens, on the charge of cruelly and unnecessarily punishing the son of Samuel Purdy, yesterday returned a verdict of not guilty. This is the settlement of the affair so far as the courts have jurisdiction, but there is said to be a good deal of bad blood in the neighborhood over the affair.

Leon Cohen is in receipt of a telegram from Robert Burns, dated Dayton, saying that the people of that place have raised nearly \$2,000 for the baseball season of this year, and will make a sure go in that place of the effort to sustain a league team, and that he, Mr. Burns, will go from that place to Colfax to see what can be accomplished there.

Good Friday Services.

Tomorrow, Good Friday, the services at the Church of the Redeemer will be held as usual at 10 a. m., and additional services at 3 p. m., and at 7:30 p. m. The church expects all her members to attend some of these services and it is hoped the privilege of attending all will be claimed by many. The Easter day announcements will be made tomorrow.

Indian Boy Hurt.

The 8-year-old son of Cash-Cash, on the reservation, fell last Friday and by way of the mouth ran a sharp stick into the soft palate. The hurt received no attention until a doctor was summoned Monday. Naturally, the throat is extremely sore and inflamed and there is danger of blood poisoning.

Behalf of Temperance.

Professor F. W. Lough and wife, of Indiana, are expected in the city soon to sing and lecture in behalf of temperance. They can be heard at the Thompson Street Methodist church. They are magnificent singers and both are the authors of songs and music. No admission will be charged to the entertainments.

In Police Court.

This morning George Dixon was given eight days in the city jail by Judge Fitz Gerald on the charge of being drunk and disorderly. Specifically, his offense was profanity and threatening and abusive language, garnished with the brandishment of a knife toward James Taylor, Gratz's bartender.

A novel exhibit has been proposed for the World's fair, St. Louis, by H. S. Edmonson, of Victor, Colorado. His scheme is to put a mine, including shaft house, pay drifts, and everything in actual mining operation on the grounds, charging a small fee to go down the shaft and see what mining really is.

HAS MUCH TRAFFIC

W. & C. R. PREPARE FOR INCREASED DEMANDS.

Many New Bridges to Be Built—Steel on the Way to Build One at This Point.

In conversation with an East Oregonian reporter, Superintendent McCabe of the W. & C. R. last evening stated that the road has in sight for this year the largest business for any year of its history.

Great efforts are being made in preparation for the increased demands upon the facilities of the road. The tour of inspection which Mr. McCabe and J. G. Cutler and W. C. Marion of the engineering and construction departments are now making has a direct bearing upon the problem of how to handle the rapidly increasing demands upon every department of the road.

One of the most important features of the situation is that the structural and miscellaneous steel supplies for the complete remodeling and in many instances rebuilding, of 35 bridges—large and small—has been ordered. About 14 months must necessarily elapse before all the proposed work can be completed. It means the expenditure of many thousands of dollars more than the regular expenditures of the company during the period the work is being prosecuted.

Of immediate interest to the people of Pendleton is the fact that the steel for the completion of the river bridge at this point has been shipped from Edgemoor, Delaware, and will probably be delivered within 10 days. Work upon the completion of this bridge will begin immediately upon the arrival of the steel, or very soon thereafter. Mr. McCabe says, "Watch and see the prettiest bridge in Umatilla county finished before long."

Mr. McCabe was reticent about the proposed Walla Walla & Dixie branch stating that he preferred to say nothing for publication until the details for the prosecution of the undertaking had been arranged. Mr. McCabe referred to the fact that from Pasco to Wallula President Roosevelt will ride over the W. & C. R. This settles a mooted detail in regard to the president's route in this locality.

In answer to an inquiry touching the improvement on Webb street, Mr. McCabe stated that the material for planing the street has been ordered and the work will be begun in a short time and completed with dispatch.

PUBLIC PARADE.

Pupils of High School Will Tomorrow Celebrate Arbor Day—Procession at 1:30 P. M.

The parade tomorrow by the pupils of the public schools will be entirely on Main street.
