West End Chapel—Corner of West Webb and Maple streets. Sunday school at 2:30. Song service on Tuesday evening.

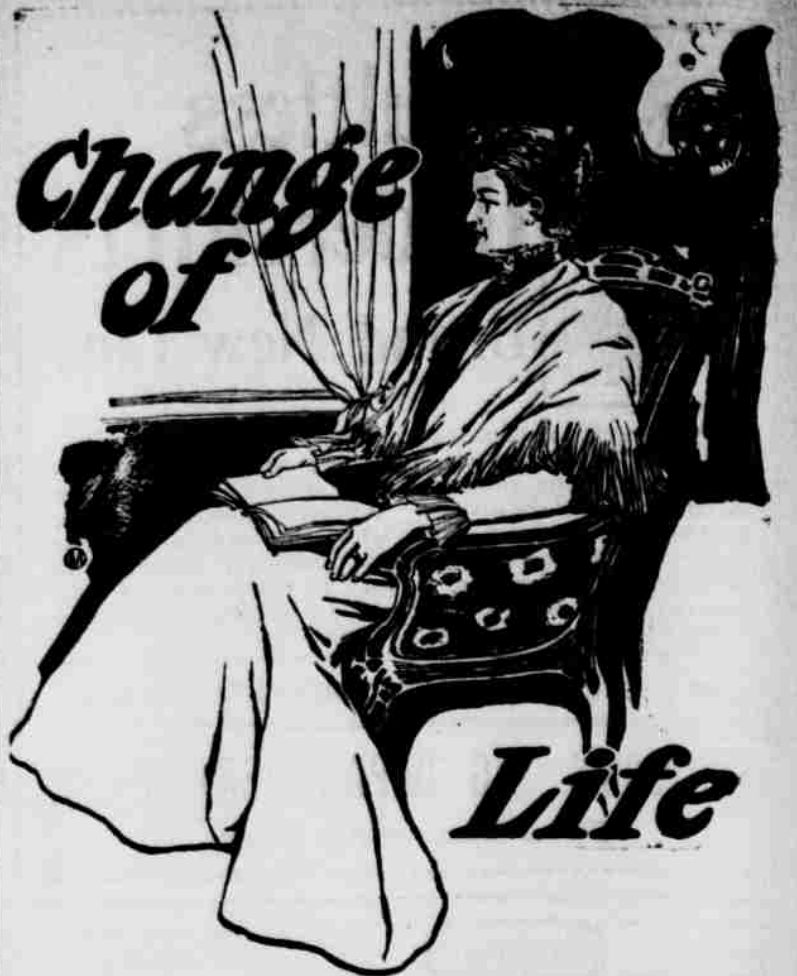
Christian Scientists—Will hold their regular services tomorrow at the home of Ed Eben, on West Alta street.
