ARBOR DAY PROGRAM

SOME DETAILS NOT MENTIONED YESTERDAY.

Sophomore Class Heralded by White Knight—Many Tastefully Arranged Floats—Primary Grades Took the Crowd.

Other details in the Arbor Day procession not mentioned yesterday for lack of time and space was the high school sophomore class which was heralded by a white knight on a white horse.

The sophomores rode in a float, beautifully decorated with chrysanthemums and lillies. There were several chariots in which rode little girls drawn by boys, and also several decorated play wagons with the same kind of burden and steeds.

Several rooms in the procession had the individual members yoked together by long festoons representing trailing vines. There was a great profusion of banners, some of them hand-painted, and nearly all bore some appropriate motto.

A very pretty detail was the platoon bearing bird houses and banners with the pictures and names of Oregon birds. The bicycle brigade, on account of the necessarily slow pace for the most part walked and led their steeds.

The eighth grade float represented a great deal of hard work tastefully expended. The seventh grade made a great hit, with pennants representing trailing vines suspended from the staffs of banners. The sixth grade with their bird houses, bird banners and bird cages showed perhaps, a more real originality in the designs than any other department.

The fifth grade was the bicycle brigade which for the most part walked. Nearly every wheel was prettily decorated, and this platoon could have made, if detached from the procession, a very effective exhibit.

The Fields school scholars were in the front rank with the profusion and excellent taste of their equipment. The little ones from the primary grades "brought down the house" all along the line of march. Each child bore the brand of a flowering tree—peach, plum or apricot, and the scheme was recognized for its singular appropriateness by every observer as soon as the little ones put in an appearance.

All the teachers aver that the suggestions of the scholars themselves were utilized from the beginning in arranging for details of the displays. Every opportunity was given them to display their ingenuity, both in their personal habiliments and in the matter of suggestions for the floats and other general features. But the teachers themselves bore the most of the burden of thought and hard work, necessarily.

WILL HAVE FAIR GROUND.

Site Consisting of Forty Acres Selected Near Walla Walla. Walla Walla, Wash., April 11.—The sale of stock in the Walla Walla Fair Association has progressed so favorably that the trustees expect to meet either this or tomorrow evening to conclude negotiations for the purchase of 40 acres south of the city on which an option is held, and also to arrange for the collection of money for stock already sold.

Immediately upon closing the deal for the site the trustees will advertise for bids for the construction of the track and the erection of the fence, stables and fair buildings. Once commenced a trustee said this morning, the work would be rushed to an early completion, as the association fully expect to hold a race meet and a fair this fall.

It is the desire of the trustees to have no indebtedness hanging over the association after the site is purchased and the necessary buildings are up, and for that reason every step will be carefully considered before being taken. The site, consisting of 40 acres, will cost about \$5500. The amount it will take for the construction of the track and the erection of the fence and buildings will be estimated just as soon as the deal for the site is closed. The trustees will advertise for bids for the work as soon as possible as the association fully intends to hold a race meet and a county fair this fall.

To Extend Pacific Cable. San Francisco, Cal., April 10.—Within the next few days, if present plans are carried out, the steamer Grace Dollar will depart from this port carrying supplies and materials for the construction of the Pacific cable station on Midway Island. This will be the first step in the work preliminary to laying the cable between Honolulu and the Midway Islands which is to form the second link of the cable which is to connect the United States with the Philippines.
