HIDE AND PELT MARKET SHOWS LITTLE CHANGE.

Dry Sheep Pelts Off Half a Cent-Advance in Price of Hogs-No Market for Wheat

The local hide and peit market shows no changes from last week's positions further than are indicated in the price list, which shows an ad-vance of 10 cents on first quality mink hides and 10 cents per hide for coyote hides, if they are first-class Dry sheep pelts are off half a cent for a steady quotation, being now but for a S cents per pound for every day. During the week, however, there have been lively times on the mar-ket, as is indicated by one load of dry beef hides being sold for 13 cents, some dry sheep pelts for 8½ cents, and some green sheep pelts for 7 cents.

cents. Those were flurry prices and did not hold good for an entire day. The heef hides coming in now are in much better condition than those of-fered a short time ago, not being grubby. All hides and pelts are comparatively scarce-very much so than a short time ago.

George Crawford, who is in the field good deal of the time with a wagdeclares that he has to drive any where from 100 to 200 miles to get a load of sheep pelts and beef hides. Wild pelts are scarce, but the qual-ity is uniformly good as to condition and evidences of care being taken with them. In the livestock market the most

noticeable thing is a market advance everyday price for them. They are now bringing \$6.25 and the buyers for the outside markets hustling to

to 15 cents per bunch, rhubarb at 7 cents per bunch, asparagus at 1212 cents per bunch, lettuce at 5 cents per bunch, and young onions at 5 cents per bunch, three bunches for 10 cents or 40 cents per dozen.

#### The Wheat Trade.

Portland, April 16.--Crop condi tions are not as favorable at the present time as one year ago; there has been a decrease of 60 per cent of all acreage, and a spring acreage will hardly show a net increase of 26 per cent. The outlook is not very encourag

ing; fall grain has not stooled very well yet, and spring grain, sown early, hardly shows any green above the ground. In some counties fall acreage has entirely been abandoned, and unless something unexpected should happen, the crop will hardly be as large as that of 1902. The weather is cold and the ground needs a good deal of sunshine and warmth Barley shows a very large increase in acreage and will exceed that of the previous season. Farmers are almost all through seeding all over the Northwest, and a good deal of sumthe mer fallowing is being done. Wheat remaining in the country unsold will hardly amount to 1,500,000 bushels. A great deal of wheat is in the hands of millers and exporters, and there is no doubt that fully 3,000,000 bushels remains in the country. It looks to one who has traversed the wheat country that the season will be very backward and new wheat will hardly be marketed before by heat ber. Boston, April 16 .- A somewhat im-proved tone is noticed in the wool market, with an increased movement especially noted in medium wools. Prices are steady. Territory and Western wools are rather quiet. Fine staple, 50@53; scoured fine, 48@50c; fine medium, 47@48c; medium, 43@ 45c. 


