A Fine Hearse.

The new \$1600 hearse just imported by Baker & Folsom, is a work of art. The prevailing colors are black and silver. It is rubber tired, and axles and fifth wheel are roller-bearing and dust proof. The body of the vehicle is absolutely dust proof as well. Every particle of metal entering into its composition is annealed steel except the silver mountings. The solid ornamental work is either lacquered steel, bronze or silver mounted. The hangings are embroidered satin, hand woven. The rollers carrying the casket are of mahogany, and also ball-bearing. The monogram of the firm, in hand-carved relief, decorates the driver's box. The vehicle was manufactured by Sayers & Scoville, Cincinnati, Ohio.

London, April 18.—Primrose Day, otherwise known as the anniversary of the death of Lord Beaconsfield, who died April 19, 1881, was generally celebrated here today. About two-thirds of the people in the streets wore primroses in their buttonholes. Beaconsfield's statue in Parliament square was very effectively decorated with wreaths and other floral offerings sent from many parts of the world.
