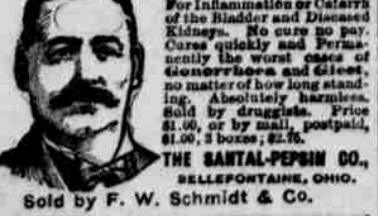

Reunion of Sultana Survivors.

Knoxville, Tenn., April 25.—Grand Army veterans in East Tennessee are taking much interest in the reunion of the Sultana Survivors' Association, which is to be held tomorrow at Wildwood, Blount county. This is the only organization of its kind in the United States. The Sultana was a transport in the packet service which ran between Vicksburg, Miss., and Cairo, Ill. It left Vicksburg on the night of April 23, 1864, and reached Memphis on the morning of April 28, and left then for Cat Island and when near there the boiler on the boat exploded and the craft was burned. Over 1500 people lost their lives, among them being over 1200 soldiers who were returning from Southern prisons where they had been confined. The survivors of the catastrophe have maintained the organization many years, though of late the ranks have been so thinned by death that the membership now is very small.

B'Nai B'Rith.

Pensacola, Fla., April 25.—Many delegates are arranging for the annual convention of the District Grand Lodge, Independent Order of B'Nai B'Rith, the most prominent Hebrew charitable and fraternal order in the world. The district comprises the states of Louisiana, Texas, Florida, Alabama and Mississippi. The convention will open tomorrow and continue in session several days. Questions of local needs and relief and of meeting the problem of increased accessions to the ranks of refugees from European persecution will engage the attention of the convention.
