GENERAL NEWS.

German manufacturers and exporters propose to boycott the St. Louis Exposition.

A woman upset a rowboat ferry in East river, New York, Thursday. The 12 passengers were rescued.

In a riot between Hebrew and Christian girls at Newark, N. J., Thursday night several girls were injured.

Max Zelter is about to recite the great seal of the United States, and will be closely shadowed by secret service men while at work in Philadelphia.

The Commercial Club, of Albuquerque, has elected President Roosevelt an honorary member. His membership card will be a Navajo blanket with a woven legend.

Joseph Boyd a retired farmer and ex-Confederate officer, was found dead on the back porch of his home at Mexico, Mo., from a bullet wound in his chest. It is believed he committed suicide.

John Crempa, who has died at Perth Amboy, N. J., 20 years ago in Hungary confessed to stabbing a man to save his wife from punishment, and served 10 years before he was released. He came to this country when he found his faithless wife living with another man.

Two Indians were killed in a fight between outlaws and a posse on the lookout for smugglers headed by Deputy United States Marshal Utting, in the Gunsight country on the Mexican border of Arizona. Rangers and citizens will reinforce the marshal, who is believed to be in close quarters.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Sluashes in Eastern Oregon are starting on their annual summer outing.

James Champoux, found guilty recently in Seattle of the murder of Lottie Bruce, a concert hall singer, may escape the gallows on a technicality.

The wife of Gen. A. E. Woodson, who is dying from a paralytic stroke at Great Falls, Mont., is hurrying to his bedside from Wichita, Kan. They have been estranged for years.

North Yakima people are aroused over the raising of the theater license by the council of that town from \$100 to \$250 a quarter. It may result in the closing of places of amusement.

Four Walla Walla land claimants erected a cabin that covers the corners of four sections in Franklin county, Wash., and each will claim the house as his residence in case of contest.

Austin Craig, postmaster at Whiteley, Grant county, was arrested Wednesday afternoon by Deputy United States Marshal Hall on a charge of stealing a registered letter containing \$72 on July 21, 1902.

Secretary Hitchcock has ordered the temporary withdrawal from entry except under the homestead act, of 42 sections of land along the south bank of the Columbia river extending from Willows past Arlington to Blalock.

On request of Secretary Hitchcock, the department of justice has instructed the United States attorney at Portland to take steps looking to the arrest of Marie Ware, late United States commissioner at Eugene, Or.

A JUST ASSESSMENT

W. & C. R. ADMIT JUSTICE OF MR. STRAIN'S POLICY.

Superintendent McCabe Declares That His Road is Ready to Pay Their Just Share of the Taxes.

Superintendent McCabe, of the W. & C. R., paid the assessor's office a visit yesterday for the purpose of discussing the assessment of that company's property in this county. The assessor reports that Mr. McCabe will not resist a just assessment. He answered questions relating to the value of his road frankly and fully, using the interstate commerce report as authority for his statements.

Mr. McCabe's attitude seemed entirely fair. He freely admitted the justice of the assessor's policy in making no distinction in favor of the transportation companies.

He declared that he has no concern whatever as to whether his road is valued at \$1,000 per mile or \$10,000 so long as the same per centage of actual value is placed upon all other property. No definite valuation was agreed upon, but Mr. McCabe left with the assessor references to official data that will enable him to look up the matter later.

Mr. Strain feels that Mr. McCabe and the W. & C. R. deserve the good will of every taxpayer in the county for the example which they have set.

Many Deer in Camas Prairie.

Captain L. S. Kidd, Wade & Caldwell's ranch manager in the mountains, was in the city yesterday. He now has the immediate care of 430 head of beef steers in the mountains which the company will feed for the market this summer. Mr. Wade's 418 head of cows and calves now at Echo will be driven to summer range on Camas Prairie next week. Captain Kidd reports stock in fine condition and the grass growing finely. It is keeping away in advance of the stock. The captain has seen 28 mule and white-tailed deer this spring between Camas Prairie and the mountains.

Very Valuable Farm.

J. N. Gerkin, of Athena, was in town yesterday, attending the day session of the A. F. and A. M. Mr. Gerkin owns a farm which has the distinction of having commanded the highest figure of any farm in North-eastern Oregon. There are 240 acres in the tract, and he has been offered \$20,000 cash for it, or over \$83 per acre. While it is a very fine farm, it must not be understood that it is valued at that figure except in the special sense that the party who offered that figure wants it very badly, but Mr. Gerkin wants to keep it too much to take that amount of money for it.

General Prosperity Evident.

A good evidence of the general prosperity is found in the fact of the heavy trading being done with our merchants. Lee Cohen reports that the Peoples Warehouse has sold more goods the past three weeks of April than he has ever before sold during the entire month of April.

Fruit at Foster.

C. C. Dunn, the O. R. & N. section foreman at Foster, reports the fruit prospect down there as excellent, and that there is very little sickness. The grain and hay crops are looking finely, and the entire Foster-Echo neighborhood is prosperous.

Will Move to Pendleton.

M. L. Warren has sold his Foster farm of 110 acres for \$4,000. It is probable that he will buy lots and build a residence in Pendleton. The land he sold is a portion of the original but since abandoned townsite of Foster.
