
GREAT RELAY RACE.

Philadelphia, Pa., April 25.—For the ninth consecutive year the cream of college athletes of the entire country line up on Franklin Field this afternoon for the annual relay races conducted under the auspices of the University of Pennsylvania, Yale, Harvard, Columbia, University of Chicago, Pennsylvania, Amherst, Princeton, Cornell and other large colleges, besides a long list of smaller institutions, have sent their very best athletes to compete in the various best athletes to compete in the various events and there is every reason to helieve that several records will go by the board before the afternoon's program is completed.
