### GENERAL NEWS.

A posse of citizens who were on the lookout, had a running pistol fight with six would-be bank robbers early Saturday at Frankfort, Ind. The intruders escaped.

The New England manufacturers and erectors of structural steel works have withdrawn from the National association recently formed by 56 concerns in various parts of the country.

Three men blew up the safe in the postoffice at Ferguson, Mo., securing \$120 cash and \$18 in stamps. The noise aroused the citizens who gave battle to the robbers. No one was hurt.

Four burglars blew open the safe of Munn & Sons' private bank at Portage, O., early Thursday and secured \$3,000 in silver and paper money. They made their escape on a handcar.

It is reported that the National Bank of Commerce of New York will soon pay an extra dividend of 53 per cent out of its surplus as a preliminary to consolidation with the Western National. The dividend will aggregate \$5,300,000.

The Louisville & Nashville train to Maysville, Ky., was held 19 minutes at Lexington, Ky., while Louis Lunsford, a passenger, who got into a fight on the train, was arrested, taken to the station house, tried, fined, paid the fine and was allowed to leave for home.

Peter Snake Wolf, a fullblood Cherokee, was assassinated in the Spavinaw hills, east of Vinta, I. T., Saturday. He was shot six times with a Winchester rifle, supposedly by full-blooded Indians who are opposed to the allotment of the lands of the Cherokee nation.

The Jews at Kishineff, capital of Bessarabia, during the anti-Semitic riots there April 29, suffered even more severely than admitted officially. Scores of Jews were shot or beaten to death and several hundred were wounded. Their houses were wrecked and their shops were sacked. Thousands of Jews in the district are homeless and destitute.

Gold has been found in coal dug from the Benton mines, five miles from Seattle.

The United States signal service will install a wireless system in Alaska by August 1.

The striking miners at Amador, near Stockton, Cal., have won a complete victory and will begin work at once.

Serious trouble is brewing in labor circles in Sumpter over the boycotting of places hiring Chinese and Japanese.

A rate war has been declared by the shippers engaged in the coast trade between San Francisco and Gray's Harbor.

Dr. J. H. Rosenberg, who has been fighting the smallpox scourge at Prineville, has been stricken with the dread disease.

Mrs. Robert Adams, of Glad Tidings, Or., lies in an unconscious condition in Woodburn, as the result of a runaway accident Saturday morning. Her skull is fractured and she will probably die.
