Smith Speaks of the Conditions of the Disease in Crook County.

Dr. C. J. Smith was called into consultation yesterday by Dr. A. C. Smith, president of the state board of health, concerning the smallpox situation at Prineville. Dr. Smith says that while the conditions at that place is not so serious as has been reported at other times in the past few days, still it is serious enough to teach the people their duties in the matter of such diseases.

Smallpox is not a disease for which there is any specific treatment, but is one of prevention. If the people could be vaccinated as it is their duty to be, the scourge could be easily prevented with little or no loss of life, but when the people will not take such a simple precaution it becomes a serious matter.
