MALTHON TRANSPORT FIGHT A Merciful Man is

OLD SUBJECT WILL BE REVIVED ON THE COAST.

Navy Department Will Apportion Government Trade to the Philippines by July 1.

Washington, April 30.—The transport fight, that was waged so fiercely last winter, is soon to be reopened. The quartermaster department is pre-paring advertisements for proposals for carrying troops and supplies be-tween the United States and the Phil-

tween the United States and the Philippines during the fiscal year, commencing July 1 next.

The contract awarded to the Boston Steamship Company last winter expires on June 30. Attempts were made at the recent session of congress to authorize the secretary of war to make these transportation contracts for a greater period then one tracts for a greater period than one year, but without success. Under the old law, which is continued, contracts must be renewed on July 1 of each year

During the few months that the Boston Steamship Company has been carrying government supplies from Tacoma it has been able to demonstrate to the department its ability to handle the government business in a manner quite satisfactory. If this company, through a successful com-bination with the railroads, can submit a favorable bid in the coming competition there is good reason to believe that its pending contract will be renewed.

Decision Without Prejudice.

A great amount of political influ-ence has been brought to bear by San Francisco to get the trade away from Puget Sound and this same pressure will be again in evidence when the new contract is let. But it is fortu-nate for Tacoma that the new quar-termaster-general is a man who cares not a blt for influence. He is a bustman through and through and the best quartermaster in the entire army. He will have arrived in Washington before the new awards are made, and will take personal charge of the entire affair. General Humphrey will not be

swayed by the California delegation, by the importance of the Harrimans, of on the other hand, by Jim Hill, or the Winsors. He will see to it that the best business proposition is accepted and it will matter not whence comes the offer. comes the offer

Necessity of Barracks.

In the coming awards, as in the old ones, no assurance is to be given by the department that any stipulated amount of business will be given to the successful line or lines. The competition will be open and no reservations will be made, nor will one port be given an advantage over another.

other.
If Tacoma makes the best offer, there is every reason to believe the contract will go to Tacoma. If Seat-tle makes it, that port will be recog-nized, and the same is true of San Francisco. But the chances are that the troops, or most of them, will con-tinue to go by the Golden Gate route, because of the accommodations at that port; accommodations which are lacking on Puget Sound.

The government is still unwilling to erect large barracks on the sound for the accommodation of incoming and outgoing soldiers, and the mili-tary posts have not nearly the facilities for accommodating any men in addition to their regular garrisons. At some time in the future the de-partment may be forced into establishing a large army camp at or near American lake, but that time has not yet arrived.

Preference for Private Lines.

The war department is desirous of placing most of the carrying trade be-tween the Philippines and the United Free 'bus meets all trains States in the bands of commercial lines. There is a desire to gradually retire the army transports, but the capidity with which they are sold or placed out of commission depends largely upon the attractiveness of the offers made by commercial steamship companies. The department believes that private lines can handle govern-ment business at less cost than the government itself, out there is a termination to let no contracts at ex-cessive prices. The bidding will largely determine the awards that are to be made on contracts that are effective July 1 next.
