GENERAL NEWS.

Spain controls the Cuban shoe market.

India exports \$46,000,000 worth of cotton last year.

On many of the cement ties are replacing wooden ties.

One cent coin in Wurtemberg exports \$10,000 harmonicas per annum.

One factory at St. Etienne, France, made last year 269 cannons to be used against halibut.

Law students of the University of Havana became riotous Thursday because the date of examination was changed from September to June, and burned the university buildings, breaking windows and destroying several valuable paintings.

The women of Independence have organized a strong Lewis and Clark club.

Owing to extremely cold weather in Lake county, sheep shearing has been temporarily suspended.

The price of tickets to the Roosevelt banquet in San Francisco has been fixed at \$20 each.

A strike of Spokane mill workers has been ordered, because the mill owners refuse to arbitrate differences.

The death list in the Frank mine disaster numbers 64, up to date. Damages to the mine will aggregate \$100,000.

The body found floating in the Sound Friday, has proven to be that of John Shankman, who disappeared from Tacoma last week.

Insurance to the amount of \$57,000 was carried by the property destroyed at Portland in Friday's fire. The loss will reach \$280,000.

Hale Ware, the absconding land commissioner of Eugene, has telegraphed from San Francisco that she will return to Eugene May 8, to face her troubles.

The Montana Club building, at Helena, costing \$165,000, and said to be the finest club building on the Pacific Coast, was destroyed by fire Friday morning.

Amory H. Bradford, moderator of the national council of the Congressional Union, of Montclair, N. J., will visit Portland and other coast cities during May.

Old Indian relics, weapons, mortars and bones have been washed out of a stream of gravel 75 feet below the surface by the hydraulic machines working near Grant's Pass.

An Indian was found hanging by the neck in Kittitas canyon, Friday was in company with his father and brother and suspicion points to them.

FOR OREGON'S GOOD

MRS. WEATHERED TELLS OF HER SPLENDID PLANS.

Would Encourage Oregon Farmers and Their Families to Collect Exhibits of Fruits, Grains and Grasses for Agricultural Building at the Fair.

Many interesting features of exposition work in connection with the Lewis and Clark Centennial was given to a press representative this morning by Edyth Tozier Weathered, who spent yesterday with Mrs. Lee Moorhouse. "The women have much to do and from the enthusiastic manner with which they are taking hold certainly insure grand results," said Mrs. Weathered. "I find the women throughout Eastern Oregon ready to grasp every detail and all realize the necessity of system to earnest action."

One plan which is being arranged by Mrs. Weathered is to solicit the co-operation of the farmers' wives and others in the preparation of bottled fruits and berries ready for table use, thus making the most extensive exhibit of this nature ever presented in the world.

Oregon is better adapted for this display than any state in the union and Mrs. Weathered declares her intention of carrying out this idea to the satisfaction of the fair directors and the credit of the state.

"Another practical plan," said she, "is to have the farmer boys begin this summer to select sheaves of grain and grasses prepare them and put away and by 1905 there will be several thousand of the very best and most beautiful sheaves of grains with which to decorate the agricultural hall."

"Each county will display to the very best advantage and this done by the farmer boys of Oregon, will be not only interesting to those gathering the samples, but will present a glorious lesson of our agricultural resources, arranged in unique designs."

Then, too, the school children will be asked to gather, press and mount the Oregon wild flowers, giving botanical name and remarks on elevation of different growths.

"Another plan," stated Mrs. Weathered, "is to ask the school children to write compositions on the resources of their particular part of the state. We aim to have them and of them to give to the visiting teachers."

Mrs. Weathered related experiences at Omaha, Buffalo and Charleston, of how they had to have guards to protect the exhibits to keep people from taking samples of grains, which visitors wished to carry away as Oregon souvenirs. The long straws of wheat, oats, barley and others being of great surprise and she remarked that the farmer boys could do an unlimited amount of advertising by supplying the agricultural hall with enough samples that everyone wishing to have a sample would be abundantly supplied.

Mrs. Weathered's past exposition experience has given her a vast number of practical ideas to be applied to various department work. Different portions of the state are calling for her. During the next two weeks she will visit several Grange lodges, where she has been invited to address them.

Mrs. Weathered stated today that she presumed that if she were a man she would be receiving at least \$200 a month to impart her exposition knowledge, but as there has been no arrangements made to meet these expenses she is at present doing it from a matter of patriotism. "The time is too short and too much to be done," said Mrs. Weathered, "for any one who does know what to do, to sit by and wait until some one else finds out what they wish to do."

CLOSING EXERCISES.

Third Day of Dedicatory Ceremonies Brought to Successful Close.

St. Louis, May 2.—This was the third and last day of the dedicatory exercises of the world's fair and though doubt had been expressed in some quarters as to the wisdom of the managers in extending the exercises over three days their good judgment was attested by the fact that there was no diminution of interest apparent etc. The day's program began with a large civic parade, which moved over the same route of the big military procession of Thursday and, arriving at the exposition grounds, was reviewed by the visiting governors.

In the afternoon formal exercises, consisting of a welcome to the visiting governors and other state officials, were held in the Liberal Arts building. The address of welcome was delivered by Governor Dockery, of Missouri and the response by Governor Odell, of New York. Immediately after the close of the ceremonies the governors proceeded to the building sites selected for their respective states, where corner stones were laid and state colors raised with appropriate ceremonies.

GERMANS IN ARGENTINA.

Descendants of German Settlers Forming Associations.

Buenos Ayres, May 2.—At a conference held here today the preliminary steps were taken for the establishment of a German association in Argentina. The object of the movement, which is attracting wide attention, is the formation of a close union between Germans and descendants of Germans living in Argentina, for protection in event of abuse by the Argentine authorities or maladministration of justice. The promoters of the movement declare that the association has no intention of disputing Argentine sovereignty or of asking aid of the German government.
