GENERAL NEWS.

A Pittsburg company will build a railroad across Nicaragua.

Charles M. Schwab has been re-elected president of the United States Steel Corporation.

Twenty-nine were drowned as the result of the Hamilton-Saginaw collision in Chesapeake Bay.

An American company has leased 200,000 acres of mineral land in Siberia, for development purposes.

In many parts of the northern, eastern and middle states, frost has injured the fruit prospects. Apples suffered least.

Drouth prevails in Northern Texas. Florida, the lake region, New England and Central Mississippi and Ohio river valley states.

The Omaha Horsehoers' Union refuses to shoe horses driven by non-union teamsters. The town is on the verge of a fuel famine.

The third trial of ex-Secretary of State Powers, charged with being accessory to the murder of Governor Goebel, three years ago at Frankfort, Ky., has been postponed.

Returned missionaries state that actual slavery exists in the Congo Free State, Central Africa, conducted by white men and blacks, and that redress cannot be had from the Free State authorities.

New York clergymen have interested capital in a pawnbroking scheme which will charge but 1/2 per cent per month on loans. It is to be a purely philanthropic institution, run on the principle of the penny lunches.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

A Denver firm has purchased the Salem electric light and power plant.

New barns to cost \$8,000, will be erected at the Oregon Insane Asylum this season.

A new sawmill company has been organized at Calapooia, with \$50,000 capital stock.

Frank Girard and J. B. Arbogast, guards in the Oregon penitentiary, have been discharged.

Mason Bolen, of Vancouver, Wash., was accidentally drowned in a mill pond near Amboy, Tuesday.

Mrs. Catherine Rogers, a Washington pioneer of 1806, died at Tacoma Tuesday, after a short illness.

San Francisco Chinese have been arrested for shipping human skeletons to China, labelled "fish bones."

The body found in the narrows at Tacoma, proved to be that of Patrick Burns, a pioneer machinist of Tacoma.

Elwood Meade, government expert in charge of the irrigation surveys in the West, is now in Portland, en route to Eastern Oregon.

Reported peace conferences between Portland employers and employees have failed to bring about a settlement of labor difficulties.

Southern Pacific boiler-makers are now discussing the advisability of going out on a sympathetic strike with the striking Union Pacific boiler-makers.

Carson Holland, supposed to have been drugged, robbed and murdered in Portland, has returned to his home after a few days' convalescence with friends in the suburbs of the city.

Alvin Baxter and Robert Heaman, two boys who plead guilty to robbing the postoffice at Springwater, were sentenced to two years in the reform school, by Judge Bellinger, Tuesday.

An infuriated cow attacked the 2-year-old daughter of Charles Timmons, of Lafayette, Tuesday. The child was pinned to the ground and gored severely, but there are hopes of its recovery.

The O. R. & N. has been awarded the contract to transport 300 members of the First Battalion of the First United States Infantry, from Portland to Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. The troops will leave Portland May 9.

NOVEL TRIP IN AUTO.

Portland Party Will Go to Missoula Mont., by Automobile.

To Butte, Mont., in an automobile, is a rather long journey to undertake. But the distance, the intervening sand deserts and mountains have no terrors for Frank Simons, of this city, who, with a party of friends, left Portland Saturday on the novel trip, says the Journal. Accompanying them is an expert automobilist. The machine weighs 2,800 pounds, and is one of the staunchest on the Coast. With 20-horse power it will have no difficulty in climbing hills and traversing bad roads. The main wagon road will be followed, the course being laid first to The Dalles, thence over east of the mountains. No camping outfit was taken along. CHURCH AND STATE

M. E. CONFERENCE DEMANDS CHANGE AT REFORM SCHOOL.

Says No Man is Capable of Teaching Future Citizens Who is Not a Strictly Religious Man.

Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar, as a member of the state board of trustees of the Oregon Reform school, yesterday received a communication from the Turner Quarterly Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, in the form of a resolution, denunciatory of "rule without religion," and declaring itself in favor of putting a man at the head of that institution who is strongly identified with some religious faith, says the Salem Statesman. Whether the resolution is designed as a slap, directly or indirectly, at the present administration, no one seemed to know; it is, however, drawn in no uncertain language as to its meaning. The resolution follows:

"To the Board of Control of the State Institutions, Salem, Oregon.

"Gentlemen: We believe the institution of the Reform School for Boys in the state of Oregon is for the purpose of correction, not of penalty; that the institution should, so far as possible, supply the place of parental oversight and guidance.

"We believe that no man is qualified to superintend the reforming of 150 future citizens of this or any other state who is not himself under the superintendence of Divine Authority.

"Therefore, be it resolved by the Turner Quarterly Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, in conference assembled, that we demand of our representatives, the Honorable Board of Control of State Institutions of the state of Oregon, that in the selection of a superintendent for the Reform school, a man be chosen possessing an unimpeachable Christian character.

Rev. A. J. Hollingsworth, in transmitting the above resolution, accompanied it by a personal letter, the text of which was in substance, as follows: "In addition to the enclosed resolution, I wish to state that the official body sending said resolutions, represents a constituency covering territory from about five miles southeast of Salem to four miles east of Stayton, and approximately six to 10 miles in breadth." Rev. Hollingsworth is pastor of the M. E. church, of Turner, in the Eugene District of the Oregon Conference.
