**SUPREME COURT.**

Several Cases Argued, But No Decisions Rendered.

The supreme court held its regular session today, convening at 9 o'clock. Four cases were argued and submitted to the court. They were:

J. A. Horseman and Eugene Carley, plaintiffs and appellants, vs. Charles H. Horseman, defendant and respondent. A suit for the surrender and cancellation of two notes, and the satisfaction of mortgages securing the same, and also for the specific performance of a contract to convey lands. T. G. Hailey represents the appellants and Stillman & Pierce the respondents. It is a Umatilla county case.

J. L. Slater, plaintiff and appellant vs. La Grande Light & Power Company. The suit is in equity for the foreclosure of a contractor's lien upon a certain dam and the land upon which it is situated in Union county. Appellants' attorneys, J. D. Slater and R. J. Slater; J. W. Knowles for the respondent.

J. M. Walker, plaintiff and appellant, vs. First National Bank of Athena and Hugh McLean defendant and respondent. A suit for conversion of wheat, the property of said J. M. Walker, by the defendants. James A. Fee and R. J. Slater represented the appellants; J. J. Balleray and Carter & Raley the respondents. It is a Umatilla county case.

J. R. Killgore, plaintiff and respondent, vs. George Carmichael, defendant and appellant. This is a suit to establish the boundary line between the southeast and southwest quarters of section 33, township 5, north of range 35, in Umatilla county. The plaintiff being the owner of the southeast quarter of said section, and the defendant the owner of the southwest quarter. T. G. Hailey was the appellant's attorney, while Stillman & Pierce represented the respondents. It is a Umatilla county case.

**STOCK CONDITIONS**

**J. H. GWINN REPORTS SHEEP LOSSES LIGHT.**

Shippers Must Observe Regulations in Dipping—Wool Clip and Lamb Crop Very Satisfactory.

J. H. Gwinn, secretary of the Oregon State Woolgrowers' Association, has returned from an extended visit to the range districts of Eastern Oregon and Southern Idaho, and reports sheep in excellent condition for shearing and lambing.

He finds that the heaviest losses in Idaho occurred in the desert districts where practically no feed had been prepared. For years the sheepmen in these districts have wintered their stock without preparing any amount of feed and as the past winter was unusually severe, their losses were heavy.

Mr. Gwinn places the losses for Idaho at 15 per cent, and says that all the bands he visited are now in excellent spring condition. Lambing is in progress with bright prospects for a large per cent increase.

In Oregon, while the feed was cleaned out completely in every locality, the losses were exceedingly light, 4 1/2 to 5 per cent being the estimate given.

In regard to the dipping regulations of the agricultural department, Mr. Gwinn calls the special attention of sheepmen to some of the requirements.

The shipping season having arrived, it is quite necessary for all sheepmen to become thoroughly familiar with the regulations.

The following are quotations from the instructions to the federal inspectors:

"No attention should be paid to dipping unless superintended by federal inspectors; no certificate can be issued unless at least 10 days have elapsed from date of last dipping. Dip once for immediate slaughter, twice for feed yard or range within 10 days. Wait 21 days before shipping if owner dips without assistance of inspector."

These regulations are intended to benefit sheepmen and those who are interested in keeping down disease will see that they are rigidly enforced.

The tendency in Eastern Oregon is to cut down the flocks, feed more stock for market and own land enough for summer range.

There will be a heavy per cent of lambs raised all over Eastern Oregon and the wool clip promises to be over the average.

**WATER COMMISSION.**

Number of Delinquents Much Decreased.

The water commission held its monthly meeting yesterday afternoon at which time the usual bills were audited and matters of routine interest discussed.

A month ago the commission ordered that all delinquents be disconnected from the service and as a result the delinquent list for the present month is less than \$100.

Brick and Tile Factory and Creamery Considered.

The Pendleton Commercial Association met in their regular monthly meeting last evening at the association rooms, with Vice-President Jones in the chair.

T. C. Taylor reported that he had received information from R. C. Judson that the space for the Umatilla county exhibit in the union depot at Portland had been secured. The committee was ordered to continue and to take charge of the matter.

B. T. Hoover, of Wasco county, was present at the meeting and made inquiries as to the facilities for a brick and tile factory here. The matter was discussed and it is thought that there is clay in the vicinity of Pendleton suitable for the manufacture of brick. The club will give the matter its attention.

The secretary was instructed to make a favorable reply to the gentleman, stating the advantages of the country and what could be expected by a man putting in that kind of a plant here.
