GENERAL NEWS.

The rebellion in Nicaragua is growing in volume and strength.

Stanford University is having a siege of typhoid fever.

There is constant rioting in progress at Salonica between Christians and Moslems.

The British government will buy and nationalize all the railroads of the Transvaal.

A company capitalized for \$25,000,000, will control all the trolley lines in and across New Jersey.

Great Britain announces the policy of not allowing any other power to fortify any point in the Persian Gulf.

A lock-out at Gloversville, N. Y., is expected to result in 7,000 idle factory employes at that place in a few days.

Colonels Santos and Delaering have been sentenced to death at Manila for instigating and leading the recent revolt in Rizal province.

The coal operators of Indiana and Illinois admit in their answer in the United States circuit court that they have acted under an agreement.

The Manila correspondent of the London Daily Mail, declares that the American government of the Philippines is a failure and has been such from the beginning.

An investigation of the methods of the entire postoffice system of the country is about to be made to satisfy charges of corruption beginning with the heads of departments.

Governor Mickey, of Nebraska, notifies employers that he will not order out troops on account of strike disorders unless requested to do so by the civil authorities.

The Portland public baths will be opened about June 1.

Edward Hawkins, aged 14, of Whatcom, Wash., was killed Wednesday, by a falling tree.

The portion of a meteor reported to have been found at Oswego, Or., proves to be a fake.

Portland is discussing the advisability of raising circus licenses from \$250 to \$500 per day.

The lumber haulers of Union, Or., have struck for \$3 per thousand. They now receive \$2.

Clearing the right of way for an extension of the Sumpter Valley railway has been started.

Wilbur Ross, a shoe clerk of Roseburg, was held up and robbed of \$8 by a lone footpad, Wednesday.

The Seattle Brewers' Union, which has had some slight difficulty with employers, has decided not to strike.

The team and hack drivers of Portland threaten to strike May 15, unless their requests for higher wages are granted.

Ed Kebubin was shot and fatally wounded at Seattle Wednesday by O. E. Negus, for offering an insult to Negus' sister.

A electric light and power plant of 6,900 horse power capacity, will be installed on the John Day river, 40 miles south of Sumpter.

Mrs. Annie Thourst, of Vancouver, Wash., committed suicide Wednesday by taking carbolic acid. Despondency and poverty was the cause.

Senator C. W. Fulton has requested the secretary of the navy to send a portion of the Pacific squadron to Astoria during the coming regatta.

The Laborers' Protective Union of San Francisco, has won its strike against the Contractors' Association and the strikers have all returned to work under a new wage scale.

The defalcations of Police Judge Nelson, deceased, of Astoria, amounting to \$7,000, have been settled by an agreement between the city council and a brother of Judge Nelson, whereby the city accepts \$3,500 and dismisses the claim against the bondsmen.

WILL HAVE A NEWSPAPER CELEBRATE JULY FOURTH.

Money in Sight for a Rousing Observance of Independence Day—Printing Outfit Ordered—O. R. & N. Track Survey—General Prosperity at Echo.

GROUND UNDER WHEELS.

Chris Bryeson, of North Dakota, Meets Tragic Death at Page Station.

Chris Bryeson, who had fallen asleep on the track, was ground to death early yesterday morning by a passenger train at Page, says the Walla Walla Union. The body was brought to this city last night by Undertaker W. D. Smith and the funeral will take place from Smith's establishment this afternoon.

Page is a small station on the Snake river cutoff of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company, 20 miles above Wallula. The early morning passenger stops at this place to take on water and to clear the engine fire-box of cinders.

Yesterday morning after removing the hot ash from his engine the engineer backed down to the water tank. Bryeson, who was on the train, got down and walked to the pile of smoldering cinders. The air was chilly, and he sat down on the track before the pile. It is thought the man must have fallen asleep, for when the train started up he did not move until the engine was upon him. Then he attempted to rise, but was struck by the pilot and hurled from the track. Bryeson's skull was crushed and both legs and one arm were broken. He was dead when the trainmen reached him.

The deceased was 35 years of age and a resident of Larimore, N. D. He had no relatives in the West.
