WINS FIRST GAME

PENDLETON PLAYS BALL
AT WALLA WALLA.

It Took a Game and a Half to Decide
the Day—Taylor Makes a Brilliant
Record.

Five to four in favor of Pendleton's "Indians," in 14 innings, marks the best game played yet in the Inland Empire league, says this morning's Union. It was brought about yesterday by the matching of "Slats" Taylor and Mr. "Wiggs" McGucken on the slabs. The gentlemen aforesaid proved so evenly matched that with perfect support a winning tally would have been almost out of the question. Taylor pitched the 14 innings without a base on balls—a remarkable record. He hit one man, but had no wild pitches. McGucken was very effective at critical points, had good control when it was necessary and altogether pitched a splendid game.

Home runs by McGucken and Bradley were a feature of the game. Several two-base hits and one three-bagger were sandwiched in, and the crowd got its fill of hard hitting—that is if a crowd ever can get tired of seeing the ball pounded. Nagle was the first and last man to score yesterday. In the first he got a life on Fisher's error, stole second, got third on Wilkin's infield hit and came in on an error by Dean, who incidentally made three errors out of five chances. The Pendleton aggregation was considerate enough to spare sending anything more his way. Wilkins scored on a throw to second. The Indians drew three blanks until the eighth inning, when Gass singled and Dunn got a two-bagger and Taylor virtually won his own game by scoring both with a neat single. Nagle made the winning run in the 14th as described above.

Walla Walla did not score until the fifth, when Fisher's single, errors by Taylor and Wilkins and a homer by McGucken brought in two. In the seventh Bradley's homer added the third and the fourth came in the eighth when Hogan, Fisher and Buchet singled in succession.

Walla Walla now has a fine outfield. Sturgeon Bruyette is playing great ball at third and Buchet is performing very creditably at first.

Night and Day.

The wool washing machines at the Pendleton Scouring Mills were started this morning for the season's run. After Monday next they will be operated night and day, for on Monday a night force of 20 men will be put to work.

The whole mill is now in operation, from the sorters to the picking machines, and the balers. Wool is still coming in at the rate of four carloads a day, and more would be received but for the scarcity of cars. However, the mills are so well stocked with wool that the rail shipments will cause them no inconvenience.
