**GENERAL NEWS.**

A \$4,000,000 trust will control Virginia's output of 18,000,000 bushels of peanuts this year.

The Russian government is said to not believe that a Balkan revolt will take place this year.

A negro mail carrier in Tennessee is threatened with death if he attempts to longer serve his route.

Applications to cover the Transvaal loan of \$175,000,000, were made in London 20 fold greater than the loan.

Two hundred and twenty-seven of the 235 Presbyteries of the Presbyterian church in America, have voted for creed revision.

England, Japan, the United States possibly, and others of the nations are preparing to "shoot" the Russian bear out of Manchuria.

A suit for \$1,000,000 has been brought against the shoe trust by a Boston man, who alleges it has ruined a lucrative business for him.

Deputy Sheriff Baker, of Council Bluffs, Ia., was shot five times and killed by a man whom he attempted to arrest on a charge of burglary.

The Irish land bill has passed to its second reading in the house of commons by 417 majority. It provides for government loans to small buyers of land.

The Brooklyn builders and contractors have organized and announce that they will fight to a finish all demands of the unions "under all circumstances."

The Chicago Master Bakers' Association has raised the price of buns, rolls, cakes, cookies and crackers 25 per cent to the wholesalers and 20 per cent to the retail dealers.

John Czolgosz, brother of the assassin of President McKinley, has been jailed at Los Angeles. No charges were lodged against him. He was simply "detained" until President Roosevelt gets out of the neighborhood.

James F. Bohan, cashier of the Hotel Pleasanton, of San Francisco, has absconded with \$300 of the hotel funds.

The name of Elliott's Landing, on the north side of the Columbia, near Astoria, has been changed to Charleston.

John Franklin, aged 14, has been held to the federal grand jury at Portland for robbing the postoffice at Neskowin, Or., of \$13.

John I. Hess, of Goldendale, who was appointed as a midshipman at Annapolis, has refused to accept the honor.

Edward B. Wickham, of Eugene, formerly of Walla Walla, deserted his wife Friday, and eloped with her sister, Eva Mullen. Mrs. Wickham is left destitute.

The postoffice department will establish free rural mail routes between Whatcom and Ferndale and the service at Yakima and Colfax will be greatly increased.

Clatsop county has appointed three experienced timber cruisers as deputy assessors, who will place a valuation on the timber lands of the county. By this method it is hoped to avoid the annual row between timber land owners and the assessor over values.

**Cheap Fire Insurance.**

M. H. Rice, of Freewater, Umatilla county agent for the Oregon Fire Relief Association of McMinnville, was in the city yesterday evening, returning home on the 6 o'clock train. Mr. Rice reports considerable activity in his business this spring. The total amount of fire insurance carried in Oregon is \$100,000,000, while this association carries over \$15,000,000, or one-eighth of the total. It has been organized eight years, has paid 619 losses, levied 11 assessments, each of which were but 15 per cent of the cost of the yearly premiums in the stock companies. It is strictly mutual and the vote of the membership controls its policy.

**READY TO TAKE WARRANTS.**

Walla Walla Business Men Set an Example Which Pendleton Might Profitably Follow.

To insure the erection of the new proposed high school building with the least delay possible and also to calm any fear contractors might have as to the legality of warrants to be issued for the payment of the new school, the board of education has secured the guaranty from 25 of Walla Walla's prominent citizens and capitalists to subscribe for \$42,500 of the warrants, says the Statesman.

The following instrument which has been quietly circulated the past week, and last night was made public with the names of those who subscribed for amounts from \$1,000 to \$5,000:

"In view of the fact that Walla Walla requires the prompt construction of the proposed high school building, so that at the very earliest possible moment the present overcrowded condition of the schools may be relieved, the undersigned, each for himself, agrees that he will take at par the amount set opposite his name in warrants to be issued by School District No. 1 in payment of any contractor for work or material furnished for such building, and to so take such warrants notwithstanding any objections which may be raised as to the legality of such warrants or any suit, which may be brought in regard thereto."

(Then follows the names of the 25 citizens and institutions that have signified their willingness to purchase the school warrants, in amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000.)
