BANQUET AT ECHO

CITIZENS WILL FEAST ON AMERICAN HARE FRIDAY.

Banquet Given by People of Echo and Vicinity in Appreciation of Efforts of American Hare Packing Company—J. A. Green Master of Ceremonies.

The people of Echo and vicinity have arranged one of the most sumptuous banquets ever given in that thriving little town, to take place Friday, May 15, from 2 to 4 p. m., at the Arlington Hotel, under the management of J. A. Green, who will be master of ceremonies.

The banquet is given in honor of the promoters of the American Hare Packing and Cold Storage Company, and for the express purpose of demonstrating to the public the many table uses to which this game can be put.

An effort is being made to secure a prominent speaker for the occasion, and a grand ball will follow the banquet.

The menu for the banquet was written and arranged by Gus La Fontaine, of the French restaurant, of this city. The courses have been so arranged as to present the flesh of the American hare in every practical manner of perfection.

Invitations have been sent out and a large crowd is expected to attend this unique feast—the first American hare banquet on record in Umatilla county.

ROYALTY AT HOLYROOD.

King Edward and Queen Alexandra at Edinburgh.

London, May 11.—So many years have elapsed since a British sovereign held court in the ancient and historic palace of Holyrood that the visit of the king and queen to Edinburgh this week is attracting great attention throughout the kingdom. As previously announced, the royal couple will not remain at Holyrood, but will stay at Dalkeith palace, the Scotch country seat of the Duke and Duchess of Buccleuch, about six miles distant from the Scotch metropolis, and which has been placed at their disposal by the duke for the purpose. But they will drive into Edinburgh every day, and hold courts and levees at Holyrood.

During the king's stay in Scotland, which is to last about a week, the great officers of his household, as King of Scotland, will be in attendance on him. They are entirely distinct from the officers of the English royal household, among the most notable of them being the Duke of Argyll, who is master of the household in Scotland; the Duke of Buccleuch, who is captain-general of the Royal Company of Archers, or the sovereign's bodyguard for Scotland; Lord Stair, who is president of the council, and Lord Roseberry, who is vice-president.

FIRST WHITE CHILD.

George P. Holman Claims to Be the First White Native Oregonian.

George P. Holman arrived from Salt Lake this morning and is at the Foley. Mr. Holman is the first white child born in Oregon, his father being one of the signers of the constitutional government of this state of Champeog, on the Willamette river, in 1846. Mr. Holman is well known in this city and at one time held valuable real estate interest here. The gentleman is now in the lumber business in Salt Lake, and in fact controls the lumber interests of that city; he is also one of the delegates from Utah to the Lewis and Clark Fair to be held in Portland in 1905.—La Grande Chronicle.

FLOUR AND GRAIN RATES DOWN.

Reduction of Great Interest to Northwestern Millers.

Chicago, Ill., May 11.—The reduction in grain and flour rates from Chicago and points on the Mississippi and Missouri rivers to the Atlantic seaboard became effective today and will remain in force until September 30. While the reduction amounts to only 1 1/2 cents a 100 pounds, it is sufficient to enable the millers of the Northwest to compete with foreign millers using American grain.

IN AID OF KISHINEFF JEWS.

Jewish Merchants of New York Contribute for That Purpose.

New York, May 11.—It is expected that a large sum will be realized for the relief of the persecuted Jews of Kishineff (Bessarabia) by the united action of the leading Jewish merchants of New York in donating two per cent of their gross receipts today toward the cause. This method of contribution was adopted in response to an appeal issued by Professor Richard Gotthell, son of the late Rabbi Gotthell, and president of the Federation of American Zionists.

The same movement is on foot all over the country, and it is anticipated that a fund sufficiently large to relieve the sufferings of the Kishineff Jews will be raised within the next week.

No Strike in Theirs.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 11.—The supreme council of the American Order of Steam Engineers, an organization unique among American labor bodies by reason of its extreme conservatism in the matter of strikes, convened in annual session in Pittsburg today. The delegates in attendance number several score and represent many parts of the country. The matters to be considered are chiefly of a routine character.

Odd Fellows' Orphanage.

Lynchburg, Va., May 11.—The Odd Fellows' Orphanage recently completed here was formally dedicated today with interesting exercises. The prominent participants and speakers included Rev. P. M. Bell, and Congressman Carter Glass, who delivered the presentation address, and Grand Master Hill, who made the speech of acceptance on behalf of the order. Large delegations of Odd Fellows were present from Richmond, Danville, Roanoke, Petersburg and other cities.

Society of the Caribbean.

New York, May 11.—In commemoration of the gallant fight of the torpedo boat Winslow on May 11, 1898, the Society of the Caribbean will give its annual dinner at the Cafe Martin this evening. This society is a body of artists and writers who sketched and reported that part of the Spanish war which took place in and around Cuba. Lieutenant-Commander John B. Bannan of the United States Navy is to be the guest of honor at the dinner this evening.

Ferns vs. Duffy.

Louisville, Ky., May 11.—A 20-round go between Martin Duffy, the Chicago welterweight, and "Rube" Ferns, who recently knocked out Matty Mathews at Buffalo, is the star feature arranged by the Louisville Athletic Club for its boxing show tonight. Both men appear to be in good trim for the battle and an interesting contest is expected to be the outcome.

Bill Posters' Meeting.

Louisville, Ky., May 11.—The Kentucky Bill Posters and Distributors' Association began its annual meeting here today with President J. G. Burch, of Owensboro, presiding. The association will be in session two days at Seelbach's Hotel and a number of matters of interest to those engaged in the business will be discussed.
