

DISAPPEARING ON CONTACT WITH WHITES

Little Hope for the Perpetuation of the Native Races - Civilization Drives Them Before It, or Kills Them.

Washington, May 12.-Dr. Sheldon Jackson, of the bureau of education, who has done so much for the relief of the natives of Alaska, both in an edu-cational way and through the introcational way and through the intro-duction of reindeer for their use, re-cently delivered an address in this city before the National Indian Asso-ciation, in which he referred to the deplorable condition of the natives of Alaska, particularly in sections where there has been any considerable add

Alassa, particularly in sections where there has been any considerable ad-vent of white men. "The discovery of gold in Alaska means almost the entire destruction of the aboriginal system and race in that territory," said he. "In the last six years one-half of the entire native population in the sections where the gold has been discovered has passed away. The intemperance and immorality which have accompanied the advent of the whites to the section have been communicated to the natives, with the effect that they have become

more susceptible to disease, and they have died like files. "There is very little hope for the native race in Alaska, excepting those who are under the direct influence of the Christian missionaries." He told of the inhuman practices that obtained of the inhuman practices that obtained among some of the native tribes of Alaska, such as a son killing his aged mother at her request, and parents taking the lives of their infants, in order that there would be fewer mouths to feed and thus lessen the burden of their existence. Speaking of the more hopeful as-pects of the situation, Dr. Jackson said that for the past four years in the fields where missionaries have been at work there has been a notable

been at work there has been a notable revival of the Christian religion, and that the people showed a tendency to embrace Christianity and renounce their barbarous customs and religion The country is in need of consecrated Christian teachers, he said, and he is hopeful of an increased number of missionaries being sent to Alaska in the near future.
