North Powder Man Looking for a Location to Invest.

E. M. Sanders, the proprietor of the Sigma creamery at North Powder, was in the city yesterday for a short business visit. Mr. Sanders is looking for a location for a large creamery and dairy business and wants to come to Pendleton, provided he can make satisfactory arrangements. During satisfactory arrangements. During his stay here he inspected several properties with a view to buying and it is probable that in the fall he will

locate here.
It is Mr. Sanders' wish to buy a dairy plant near this city as a depot and point of general, distribution, where he will keep a number of cows, as many as he can find pasture for, to supply the local trade. The bulk of his milk, however, he will bring from North Powder, where he has a ranch of 1400 acres of meadow land He can secure rates on his milk from that place that will enable him to put it on the local market as cheaply as

any milk now sold.

The dairy business at the present time does not fully meet the require ments of the local demand. Owing to the scarcity of milk producing pas ture in this vicinity the local milk men can not produce milk to meet the call of their patrons. This condition of things Mr. Sanders hopes to overcome by shipping direct from the val ley of the North Powder, where the abundance of water gives fresh pas

ture the year round. Mr. Sanders returned to North Powder yesterday and will visit Pendieton again in the near future, when he will, in all probability, make definite arrangements to carry out the de tails of his scheme.


