ONE BOY AND ONE GIRL TO SEE PRESIDENT AT SPOKANE.

Peoples Warehouse Will Send Two Pupils of Public School to Spokane—Free Transportation and Hotel Expenses.

The boy and girl to enjoy this extraordinary trip are to be chosen in the following manner.

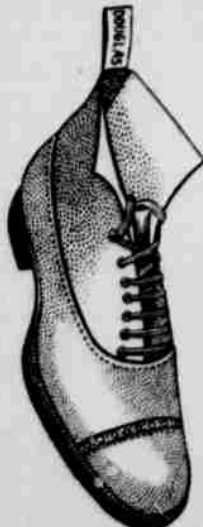
