COUNCIL MEETING

CITY ENGINEER'S REPORT SHOWS SEWER PROGRESS.

Bill for Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars on Sewer Account Allowed—New Sprinkler Ordered Purchased—Final Plans for Sewer System Adopted.

Mayor Thomas G. Halley called the council to order last evening and Aldermen Sommerville, Clopton, Howard, Hartman and Johnson responded to the roll call.

The application of A. Nolte for a liquor license was considered and granted.

The report of City Engineer G. N. Miller was read by Councilman Frank Clopton, chairman of the sewer committee, and was adopted.

A bill of \$750 was presented by Engineer Miller and was ordered paid.

The council authorized the committee on sprinkling to purchase a new sprinkling tank for the use of the city on the streets. The tank will be built in the city.

The council granted permission to the Progress Club to hang a large banner across Main street advertising the celebration of the Fourth of July.

The plans and specifications of City Engineer Miller, relating to the proposed new sewer system, were read and discussed, and adopted. The council then adjourned.

NEW PRESIDENT OF OBERLIN.

Ohio's Ancient College Has A New Head.

Oberlin, O., May 13.—Oberlin was garbed in crimson and gold, the college colors today, marking the inauguration of a new president of Oberlin College, Dr. Henry Churchill King, in succession to the late Dr. John Henry Barrows. The first church, where the inaugural ceremonies took place this morning, was elaborately decorated with flowers and potted plants. The attendance included the students, members of the faculty, trustees, alumni and friends of the institution from many points. The address of the day was delivered by President Tucker of Dartmouth College, after which the new president delivered his inaugural, taking as his subject, "Personal and Ideal Elements in a College Education."

The new president of Oberlin College was born in Hillsdale, Mich., Sept. 18, 1858. Most of his college experience has been in connection with the institution of which he is now president. In 1879 he received from Oberlin the degree of A. B. In 1883 Harvard gave him the degree of D. D. From 1879 to 1882 he was professor of Latin and mathematics in Oberlin. For two years Dr. King was a student in Berlin. Since 1897 he has been directly connected with Oberlin and was the unanimous choice of the trustees for the presidency of the institution upon the death of Dr. Barrows.

DISCUSSING HARMONY.

National Civic Federation Trying to Avert the Irrepressible Conflict.

New York, May 13.—In line with the work started last winter the executive committee of the National Civic Federation began a special meeting in this city today to further discuss ways and means for bringing about harmony between labor and capital. This is the committee of which Senator Hanna is chairman, and among the members are Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, former President Grover Cleveland, Cornelius N. Bliss, Archbishop Ireland, Bishop Potter and other men of note.

The special purpose of the present meeting, it is understood, is to agree upon some satisfactory plan by which strikes may be averted. It is said that suggestions will be made by the members to appoint arbitration boards in the various districts. These arbitration boards will be composed of representatives of all interested parties. Any trouble that arises between employer and employe will be referred to the board for settlement. If the board fails to reach an agreement satisfactory to both sides, then the matter will be placed in the hands of a higher arbitration board. The Civic Federation, it is understood, will suggest that it act as the higher board. It is further suggested that while the dispute is in the hands of either of the boards no strike can be declared.

Hart and Gardner to Meet.

Louisville, Ky., May 13.—The Southern Athletic Club expects to seat an immense crowd in the Auditorium tonight when Marvin Hart, of this city, and George Gardner, of Lowell, come together for a 20-round bout. The two fighters are considered among the best of the light heavyweights. With the exception of Hart, Gardner has won over every prominent aspirant for championship honors in his class. Hart likewise has a long string of victories to his credit and the result of tonight's meeting between the two is awaited with interest by followers of pugilism throughout the country. The men will meet at catchweights, which is regarded as a slight advantage to Hart.

KING EDWARD IN EDINBURGH.



English Royalty and Scottish Hospitality.

Edinburgh, May 13.—The second day of King Edward's visit to the Scottish metropolis was a busy one, beginning at 10 o'clock this morning with an inspection of the Black Watch in Dalkeith Park and ending at a late hour in the afternoon with the formal opening of a new hospital at Colinton. After the inspection of the Black Watch and the presentation of South African medals to the officers and men of that regiment the king and queen left Dalkeith for Holyrood house, where they took lunch. The decorated streets of the capital were crowded with spectators and their majesties met with joyous acclaim.

In the afternoon the king and queen visited Edinburgh castle, St. Giles' cathedral and the Royal Infirmary, where the king presided at the opening of the new pavilion. The drive to Colinton Mains was made by way of George IV bridge and Lauriston and the return trip to Dalkeith by way of Braid Hills and Gilmerton, without returning to Edinburgh.
