### GENERAL NEWS.

Ten men are under arrest at Wilson, N. C., charged with the murder of Percy Jones.

The dock laborers' strike riots in Valparaiso resulted in the death or serious injury of 200 men.

A police sergeant attempted to arrest a man in Kansas City, who resisted. Each shot and killed the other.

State Superintendent of Insurance Vreedenburgh, of Illinois, is making war on sixteen alleged wildcat companies.

At West Liberty, Ia., robbers who were holding up a restaurant, shot and killed Arthur Meade, who interfered in the proprietor's behalf.

The second session of the 57th congress closed March 4 last, appropriated over a billion and a half of dollars, or to be exact, \$1,753,958,506.

Rev. Henry O. Riddle, for 17 years a minister of the Episcopal church at Cumberland, Tenn., and Roxborough, Pa., has become a Catholic priest.

The retail grocers of Milwaukee have organized to boycott all manufacturing firms which "demonstrate" their products in the great department stores.

A national association of builders and contractors to fight unionism, is proposed. The movement originates in New York City, which has such an organization.

The monitor Arkansas, the first war vessel to ascend the Mississippi since the civil war, is still at St. Genevieve, Mo., unable by the sudden fall in the river to go up or down.

The government prisoners on Alcatraz Island refused to work yesterday, claiming a holiday on account of the president's visit. All were put in dungeons and are being tried today.

## NEWS FROM ECHO

### HEAVY STOCK SHIPMENTS TO IDAHO AND THE COAST.

Twenty-five Carloads of Sheep Being Loaded Today and Eleven Carloads of Cattle Will Be Loaded Tomorrow.

Echo, May 14.—O. F. Bacon, of Boise, Idaho, is here for the purpose of shipping a lot of sheep which he has purchased here and in the vicinity of Heppner. He will load about 25 cars here on the 15th inst. The sheep will be shipped to Idaho for pasture and later sold in the Chicago market.

L. Stubblefield is loading two cars of fat steers here today, and will load another car Saturday. These go to the Seattle market.

T. C. Benson will load eight cars of fat steers at this place tomorrow for the Portland market.

Arrangements are complete for the banquet to be given here tomorrow by the Arlington Hotel, and a great time is anticipated.

### BIG SHEEP SHIPMENTS.

Eight Thousand Head Will Be Loaded Here for Montana Next Week.

John Howard, the Montana sheep buyer, has contracted for over 8,000 head of sheep to be delivered here on the 20th and 25th of the present month for shipment.

He has bought the bands of Lubbs, Pomroy, Dority, McCracken, Glaze, Ross and some others, and will ship to North Dakota for the summer range. When the winter season comes he will take his sheep to Luelien, Minn., where he will feed them for the market, selling when fat to the dealers of the Eastern coast. This will be Mr. Howard's second shipment this spring.

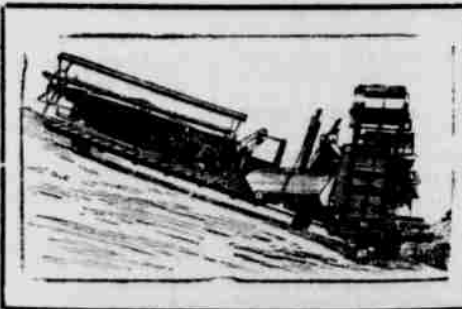
