PEACE PARLIAMENT.

Hope to Establish Peace Among the Nations of the Earth.

Boston, May 18.—The establishment of a congress of representatives of all of the civilized nations, to assemble at regular intervals to deliberate upon matters of common interest to the nations with the main view of averting appeals to arms, is the aim of a small but enthusiastic coterie of Americans who have long been identified with the universal peace movement.

The subject was discussed today at the annual meeting here of the American Peace Society and committees were appointed to further consider the matter. Today's meeting rounded out the 75th year of the society and the gathering was devoted largely to a review of the work of the organization and the general progress of the cause of international peace during the last three-quarters of a century.

Tonight the meeting concludes with a banquet at the Twentieth Century Club, at which it is expected that some 200 members of the society and their guests will be present. The speakers of the evening are to include Robert Treat Paine, the president of the society; Dr. B. F. Trueblood, the secretary; Henry Demarest Lloyd, of Ohio; Anna Garland Spencer, of New York City; the Rev. Chas. F. Dole, president of the Twentieth Century Club; Lucia Ames Mead, the Hon. Moorfield Storey and others.

Interest in Erne-Zubrick Fight.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 18.—Interest in the fight between Erne, the former lightweight champion, and Warren Zubrick, the unbeaten Buffalo lightweight, which is to be pulled off in the arena of the International Athletic Club at Fort Erie tonight, is far above that of any contest pulled off hereabouts in recent years. Erne at one time was the premier of his class, and he is still rated among the best of the lightweights, while Zubrick has disposed of men that Erne had trouble in beating, and performed the task so easily that critics of the game regard him as one of the cleverest men in the lightweight division. Both men have hosts of followers in Buffalo and a great amount of money is being wagered on the result of the contest. Since the match was made Erne and Zubrick have been training faithfully with the result that each appears to be in condition to put up a good fight.

High Prices for Berries.

The Sonoma County Berry Growers' Association has contracted the crop of its members this year at \$45 per ton for blackberries and \$110 per ton for raspberries, berries to be delivered at Santa Rosa in that county. The crop thus provided for is estimated at between 600 and 700 tons of blackberries and 25 to 30 tons of raspberries. The price to be paid for blackberries is decidedly discouraging to Oregon growers, but there would be a large production of raspberries in this state if \$110 per ton for the entire crop could be depended on.

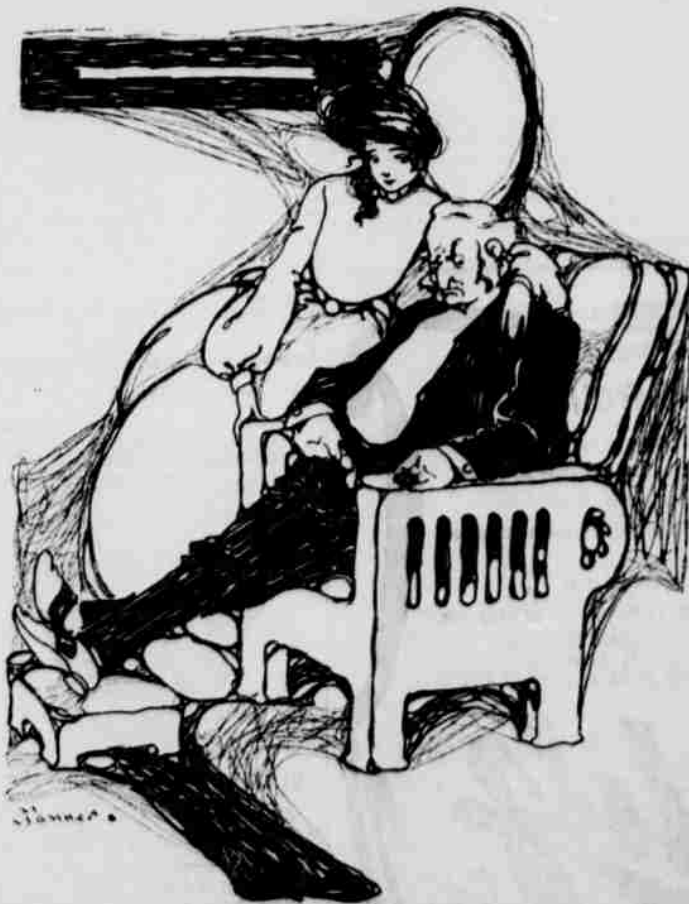
