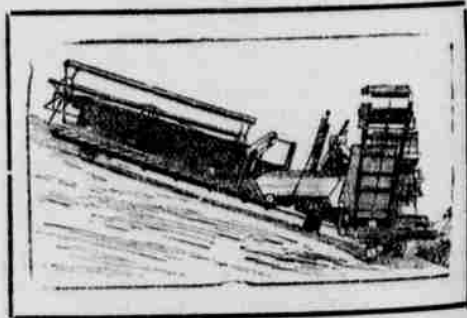

### GENERAL NEWS.

A Fall River, Mass., third story veranda collapsed, precipitating eight people to the ground. Five were uninjured, two somewhat hurt and one was killed.

The Chinese government in answer to requests for assurances of an open trade door in Manchuria, declares that Russian aggression make it impossible to give any such assurances.

Count Cassini, the Russian ambassador at Washington, states that the anti-Semitic outbreaks in Russia have their origin in the Jewish propensity to be usurers and their refusal to do manual labor.

A tramp who was ill and exhausted, fell from weakness off the porch of a Newark, N. J., residence, where he had gone to beg something to eat, and was impaled on an iron picket fence.

No one who could possibly have had anything to do with the supposed infernal machine at New York, could be found upon the Umbria upon her arrival at Liverpool. The conviction is deepening that the whole affair is a fake.

A runaway automobile carrying its owner, Dr. A. K. Lowen, ran into the lake at Chicago. Its speed was so great that it did not sink until 40 feet from the shore, and went down in eight feet of water. Dr. Lowen was uninjured.

John McReynolds, who killed William McNally, at Wellington, Wash., last March, has been sentenced to hang.

C. A. Little, ex-fish commissioner of Washington, and Mrs. Jenny Wood, are in jail at Tacoma on a charge of adultery.

George V. Schaffer, of Roseburg, has been sentenced to one year in the penitentiary for robbing a roommate of \$6.

Walter Wilmot, of Minneapolis, has accepted the position as manager of the Butte baseball team at a salary of \$400 per month.

Alex, the British Columbian who murdered his girl wife on April 19, at Vancouver, B. C., is sentenced to hang on June 19.
