LARGEST LAND DEAL YET.

Reported Blalock Fruit Company Will Take Over Thomas Lyon Ranch at Cost of \$100,000.

What will easily rank first as the largest land deal ever consummated in the county, will be the sale of the Thomas Lyons place west of Walla Walla, now pending, to the Blalock Fruit Company. It is understood that the deal is practically closed and that Finch and Campbell, owners of the Blalock ranch, will be in Walla Walla tomorrow to sign up the papers and take over the property.

The Lyons ranch lies just west of the city, adjoins the Blalock company's big farm and consists of a full section of the finest fruit and garden land in the county, though at present it is being farmed to wheat. Real estate men say the land is worth easily \$150 an acre.

The intention of the Blalock people it is said is to throw the two tracts together and make it the largest individual fruit and alfalfa farm in the Northwest. Mill creek and numerous small streams traverse the new buy.—Walla Walla Statesman.

GENERAL NEWS.

Ten thousand men are on strike at Denver.

The forests of Maine are ablaze in 30 different localities.

A boy and girl died on the streets of Brooklyn from heat prostration.

A company capitalized at \$50,000, 000, has been organized at Trenton, N. J., for the manufacture of powder and dynamite.

The dropping of a kerosene lamp in an office building at Lincoln, Neb., caused a \$125,000 fire and prostration of 15 firemen from heat and smoke.

Rev. Henry Storey, of Richmond, Mich., dropped a kerosene lamp. He was burned to death and his wife so severely burned she will probably die.

A Salt Lake boy 16 years old, accidentally came in contact with an electric light wire and received the full force of 16,000 volts. He lives and will recover.

A whale off the coast of Massachusetts fouled the nets of two men who were fishing from a row boat and towed the boat 120 miles out to sea in four hours' time.

The West Point military reservation is to have its first enlargement since the school was founded. Two hundred and twenty acres will be added at a cost of \$20,000.

There is an epidemic of diphtheria and measles among the 1,100 students at the naval training station at Newport, R. I. The barracks will be disinfectant and the boys put in open air camps.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Washington State Sunday School Association is now in session at Tacoma.

The Unitarians of the entire Northwest are now holding a general conference in Seattle.

W. W. Bowers, of Forest, Pa., has bought a 30,000-acre tract of timber land at Clatskanie, Wash.

A rich strike has been made in the Cable Cove district, near Sumpter, some of the ore going as high as \$310 per ton.

The strike of mill workers at Grant's Pass has been settled by employers conceding to a raise of \$10 a month in wages.

A banquet of 400 plates will be spread at Hotel Washington, Seattle, Saturday afternoon, on the occasion of the president's visit.

The Presbyterian general assembly, now in session at Los Angeles, has taken action toward unseating Senator Smoot, of Utah.

Because a juror went to sleep in the trial of a civil case over possession of a shooting gallery, the court has granted a rehearing.

The first excursion train on the Goldendale road will be run Saturday, when the people will celebrate the opening of the road to traffic.

A collision between a logging train and a Northern Pacific freight train occurred in the Olympia yards Wednesday, in which 10 cars were wrecked.

Charles Green, of Woodburn, has been bound over for breaking a plate glass and robbing a store. He is but 19 years of age and this is his first offense.

A swarm of bees has taken up its abode in a hollow iron pipe supporting the O. S. L. water tank and it is almost impossible to use the tank on account of them.

The striking coal miners at Dunsuir's mines, on Vancouver Island, claim the Western Federation of Miners is not giving them fair support in their struggle.

David Webb, a miner of Anaconda, left a candle burning beside his bed Tuesday night and as a result lost his house and effects by fire and barely escaped with his life.
