FLAG HAS HISTORY

ONCE FLOATED AT MANILA
NOW WAVES AT PORTLAND.

Band of the Second Oregon Volunteers the First to Salute it When it Was Hauled Up Over the Spanish Fortifications.

Portland, May 22.—President Roosevelt and every other patriotic American who today passes under the large American flag suspended high over Sixth street in front of the Portland Hotel, will gaze on it with more than usual interest when they know that it was the first American flag hoisted on the walls of the old City of Manila. It took the place of the old Spanish flag, the lowering of which marked the end of Spanish rule in the Philippine islands.

The flag was sent ashore from the battleship Olympia by Admiral Dewey, in charge of Lieutenant Brumage, and two midshipmen, who reported to General Merritt, and after the terms of capitulation had been agreed upon the Spanish flag was lowered and this flag raised in its place with the same halyards.

Saluted by Oregon Band.

There were two battalions of the Second regiment of Oregon Volunteers inside the walls at the time, and the band of that regiment on its way into the city came along just as the flag was raised, and, halting, played "The Star Spangled Banner," probably the first time that grand old air had been heard in Manila. The enthusiasm thus aroused, in connection with the raising of the flag, can be better imagined than described, and the heavens were rent with the cheers of the Americans. In which many of the inhabitants joined.

General Summers was appointed provost marshal, and it was his duty to give orders for the raising and lowering of the big flag daily. This was done for five days. It was found that the flag was too large for the staff which supported it, and was likely to break it. Then General MacArthur arrived in the city to succeed General Summers as provost marshal, and that morning General Summers ordered the large flag replaced by a proper garrison flag, which the pole could sustain.

New Engineering Hall at Ames.

Ames, Iowa, May 21.—With the dedication today of the new engineering hall of the State Agricultural and Mechanical College that institution enters upon a new era in its career of industrial training. The dedicatory ceremonies were held in the presence of a distinguished assemblage, including state officials, distinguished educators, members of the faculty, students and alumni of the college. The new building is a large and commodious structure and no expense has been spared in providing it with every convenience and with up-to-date equipment. Hereafter, by means of practical tests an effort will be made to make the engineering departments more closely connected with the industrial interests of the state than ever was possible under the old equipment.

President in Oregon.

Salem, Ore., May 21.—After an early morning ride through the picturesque Willamette valley President Roosevelt reached the capital city of Oregon on schedule time this morning. Three busy hours were spent in the city, the program including a brief address, a drive about the city, a review of the school children and other features of public interest. Governor Chamberlain, Mayor Bishop and other representative citizens extended greetings to the distinguished visitors, after which there was an informal reception. At noon the special train, amid the cheers of a large crowd assembled at the station, departed for Portland, where the afternoon and evening are to be spent.

SOUTHERN PRESBYTERIANS.

Forty-Third Annual Session Today at Lexington, Virginia.

Lexington, Va., May 21.—The forty-third annual session of the General Assembly of the Southern Presbyterian church was called to order today in the Lexington Presbyterian church by the retiring moderator, Rev. W. T. Hall, D. D., of Columbia, S. C. About 80 presbyteries, scattered variously over the states of Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Kentucky, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas, Arkansas and Missouri and Indian Territory, were represented by the 200 commissioners in attendance. The session was begun with devotional exercises, and an eloquent sermon was preached by Dr. Hall.

Several important matters will come up before the general assembly for discussion, such as Christian education, and the appointment of a permanent committee on the Bible cause, similar in character to the other standing organizations of the body.

GENERAL NEWS.

Sixty Japanese and 57 Greeks, all section hands, engaged in a race war near San Francisco. When the dust cleared away and an inventory was taken, 20 men required surgical aid. No one was killed.

There are 60 government agricultural experiment stations in the United States, employing about 1,000 men. During the 14 years they have been in existence, they have cost \$24,000,000.

There are over 7,000,000 acres of irrigated land in the United States, averaging 71 acres to the farm.

The inspector-general of Turkey is advocating a scheme to colonize Bulgarians in those islands of the Grecian archipelago which belong to Turkey.

A severe drouth in Porto Rico has been broken by violent rains which in many instances washed out the crops yet alive.

An outbreak of enteric fever has occurred on board certain ships lying off the coast of England, that is directly traceable to infected blankets from South Africa.

Twelve policemen in the New York City Clymer street station, were more or less stunned by lightning striking the building.

Five barrels of hydro-carbon in the yards of the New York Central in New York City, exploded, causing immense damage to property. One man was killed and a number injured. A tank containing 200,000 gallons of oil burned in the same yards.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

J. R. Stevenson, of Pomeroy, was elected grand chancellor of the K. of P. of the state of Washington, Thursday at Seattle.

The residents of Frank are again fleeing from the city in the fear of another landslide.

In a bloody battle between Jap and Greek section crews on the Southern Pacific, near Avon, Cal., Thursday, 10 Japs and four Greeks were seriously injured.

A. M. Smith, of Beavermouth, B. C., committed suicide Thursday by drowning.

Arthur Shaw, of Olympia, has sued Willard E. Wilson, of that city, for \$15,000 damages, for alienating his wife's affections.

The North Yakima Washingtonian, which died in April, has been started again by W. H. Willis, of Redlands, Cal.

Harry Westcott, Willie King and Jake Bowers, three Salem boys ranging in age from 16 to 18, have been sent to the Reform School for stealing bicycles.

The diphtheria quarantine at Union has been raised.

By the action of a law which goes into effect May 23, the city limits of Union will be extended one-half mile each way.

Grant's Pass has pledged \$1,000 annually for the support of a Carnegie library and it will now be built.

A Woodmen carnival will be held in Portland on July 14 to 28.

An edition of 50,000 advertising pamphlets has just been issued by the board of trade of Baker City.

The referendum petitions promoted by the mining and railroad corporations of Oregon, for the purpose of defeating the portage road and the corporation tax law, diametrically failed for want of signatures.

The state sheep commissioner of Montana estimates the loss of sheep in that state from the recent blizzard at 900,000 head, making a total loss in the state since last December, of 1,500,000.

The dredge Columbia, working in the Columbia river 50 miles below Portland, is removing 20,000 yards of sand a day from the channel of the stream.
