GRANT COUNTY MAN

Says He Uncovered the Rich Find at

Head of Old Spanish Gulch Digging Mined 36 Years Ago.

J. R. Peters, who brought to Baker City the \$2000 quartz gold nugget on exhibition at the Citizen's National Bank, was a caller at the Democrat office yesterday, says the Baker City

According to the statement of Mr. Peters, who is interested in the claims and who is manager of operations on the John Day, the nugget was found at the head of the old Spanish gulch placers 52 miles down the river from John Day city. The claims are own-ed by Robert Hines and C. W. Brown

and are located three and one-half miles from the John Day river.

The nugget was piped off the top of a ledge running across the head of Spanish guich and above the old placer workings and paled. er workings, and which is exposed \$00 feet in length. The ledge is develop-ed by a cross-cut 60 feet, showing the vein to be about two and one-half feet in width at a depth of 25 feet. A shaft 23 feet deep shows a three-foot

Mr. Peters further stated that the piece brought to Baker City is only a small part of the gold that has been MRS. H. L. He says there is at the mine over 800 pounds of quartz gold in pieces ranging from 300 pounds in weight to one pound that are richer in gold than the piece brought to this city

Mr. Peters is on his way to Salt Lake City on business connected with his mining interests and may take with him the specimens of Spanish gulch riches that Baker City people have feasted their eyes on the past

day or so. Spanish gulch, in Grant county, was the scene of lively placer mining in 1862-63 and for many years thereafter considerable gold was taken out.


