## COUNCIL MEETING

CONTRACT FOR SEWER PIPE  
SIGNED THIS AFTERNOON.

Loan of \$400 Authorized and \$1,500 Collected on an Inobedience—New Ordinance Passed Relating to Fines for Disorderly Conduct—Regular Salary List.

The council met in regular session last evening with F. B. Clopton in the chair, and Aldermen Howard, Hartman, Johnson, and Sommerville in attendance.

After the reading and disposal of the minutes, Chairman Clopton announced that he would like to meet the city attorney and the sewer committee at 4:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon to finally sign up the contract for the sewer, both as to the construction work and the piping, which latter contract had not yet been signed by the city.

A liquor license was granted to F. J. Bacon & Co. for the term of six months.

The council authorized the recorder to make a loan of \$400 to Charles Murphy, taking as security a mortgage on a lot owned by him, and situated northwest of town adjoining the Hartman property. The money was to be drawn from the general sinking fund.

The council granted permission to W. C. Burgess to pay \$1,500 on a loan of \$3,000 which he had got from the city some time ago. The permission was given provided Burgess pay the interest on the amount which was due June 5.

**Disorderly Conduct Ordinance.**  
An ordinance was introduced and passed at the session last night as a substitute for ordinance No. 12, relating to the disorderly conduct in the city, and prescribing penalties for the same.

The new ordinance removes the minimum fines and imprisonments in cases of disorderly conduct and imposes a maximum of \$50 and imprisonment for not more than 20 days. By this arrangement, the court may use his discretion in punishment.

When, as was the case in the old ordinance, the minimum was \$5 and a jail sentence, the court could not hold youthful offenders as petty misdemeanors without undue severity, and the new provision is intended to remove this defect.

Section three provides for the punishment of simple assault. In the old ordinance no one could be prosecuted for less than assault and battery. The city had to prove the beating of the defendant in order to convict. The new ordinance provides a fine of not less than \$50 or imprisonment for not more than 20 days.
