THE BOARD MEETS

SCHOOL DIRECTORS
DISCUSS LIVE ISSUES.

Teachers Will be Hired Next Satur-
day Night—Many Applicants From
Different Parts of the State Now
in—Bills Allowed.

The board of directors of the public schools met last evening in the office of Dr. C. J. Smith, and audited the accounts for the current month. A few repairs were made during the month and that with the water bills constituted practically the expense of the schools, excepting, of course, the usual salary list. Owing to a misunderstanding among the local teachers as to the date of the board's meeting, all of the applications for teacher's positions were not filed at the time of meeting. Consequently the board took no action in the matter of electing teachers for the coming year other than discussing the merits of the several teachers now employed and examining into the recommendations of the many applicants from various parts of the state. A great number of applications have been filed with the board from all over the state, many of them from experienced teachers with good records to back their claims.

To Select Teachers Saturday.

All of these applications will be given due consideration at the ad-
journed meeting Saturday evening at
which time the board will select the
teachers for the coming year.

Discuss School Room Issue.

The board also re-discussed the
question which has faced them for so
long, namely, the crowded condition
of the schools and the crying need
for added room and improved accom-
modations for the school children. It
has about come to the pass that
some provision must be made wheth-
er or no. The rooms in every build-
ing are crowded to the limit of their
capacity and there is absolutely no
room for the increase of scholars
which will result with the coming
year. Not only are the rooms crowd-
ed, but they are—some of them—un-
sanitary by reason of their location
and appointments. The basement
rooms at the high school building
have been declared injurious to the
health of the young people forced to
spend so many hours a day there and
the board is desirous of making some
arrangement whereby they can either
be vacated or made more habitable,
but they can not, or at least have not,
arrived at any definite plan of action,
for the reason that the sentiment of
many of the people seems to be
against added or increased expense
for the public school system.

Sentiment Against Schools.

It is the argument among a large
class of the residents that since they
went to school in a log cabin and re-
ceived their education in ungraded
country schools, and since they hold
their children no better than the par-
ents and as requiring no greater ad-
vantages for their development, it is
not necessary to go to great expense
to erect new buildings or improve
the school system now in vogue. This
sentiment the board finds it
hard to combat and until they see
their way clear will make no great
changes in the present condition of
things, though there will have to be
added accommodations found some-
where or many children will be forced
out of the schools in the coming
year for lack of seating room.
The board will meet on Saturday
evening to further discuss the ques-
tion and to elect the corps of teach-
ers for the coming year.

COURT MEETS NEXT MONDAY.

Quite a Number of Cases Filed, But
None of General Interest.

Judge Ellis met the lawyers inter-
ested in the various cases to come be-
fore the circuit court at the next ses-
sion in his office at the courthouse
this morning, for the purpose of set-
ting the time of trial on the docket;
but owing to the absence of Prosecu-
ting Attorney T. G. Halley, the

which will be on Monday next. Quite
