BORN ON THE TRAIN

MRS. SEARS, OF SUMPTER, ADDS TO PASSENGER LIST.

Bouncing Boy First Sees Light of Day on O. R. & N. Train, Going 40 Miles an Hour—Conductor Would Not Repeat Experience.

This will be a severe blow to the Indians, as their chief source of revenue is the work afforded by the Hood River berry patches, and when they are shut out there, certain want starve them in the face.
