FOUR DAYS OF JOY AT UNION. Celebration Will Last From July 1 to 4 Without Cessation.

Union, Ore., May 30.—Beginning with the Union County Pioneers' meeting on July 1, the Fourth of July festivities will last four days. On the 2nd and 3rd the Eastern Oregon G. A. R. will hold their annual encampment and on the 4th the citizens will hold the regular celebration.

SPENCER'S DEFENSE

ATTORNEY SAYS ABSINTHE CAUSED HIS DOWNFALL.

Story of the Family Life of the Spencers Told by the Defense—Mother of the Unfortunate Man Testifies.

The defense of Murderer Ed Spencer, who shot and killed Ella Mundt, began Tuesday morning, says the Spokane Press. According to his attorney's opening address, the drinking of absinthe is responsible for the crime. His aged mother, halfbrother and an uncle were the witnesses examined today.

Attorney Frank Graves in his opening address pictured Spencer's early life with a mother deserted by her second husband and his going out into life a quiet youth, emphasizing his affection for his mother and his general affectionate disposition.

He told of Spencer's meeting with Ella Mundt and said that the evidence will show that there was no love, no lust, no jealousy, no malice in Spencer's breast—simply companionship at dances and theaters.

Mr. Graves said he would show entire lack of motive. Explaining the cause of Spencer's action the attorney said Ed Spencer had lost his job at Davenport's on the Wednesday previous to the tragedy and began to drink heavily of whisky. Mr. Graves read from a medico-legal work concerning effect of alcohol on persons of differing temperament and said that if Spencer had entertained an idea of killing Ella he might have done so on the previous night, when he met her on Broadway and had his revolver with him.

Mr. Graves said that the testimony would show that Spencer had drunk absinthe the previous night; that the defendant himself would testify that he had no recollection from that time until he lay in the Sacred Heart hospital of occurrences of Monday, and had none since then save by way of horrid nightmares of something terrible happening. He had no recollection of writing letters or telephoning Polly Peterson or of seeing Ella Mundt on Monday.

Aged Mother Testifies.

Mrs. Spencer, mother of the prisoner, was the first witness called, escorted to the witness chair. She seemed calm, showing little visible nervousness. She is the mother of nine children, seven living, two of them younger than Ed. She said Ed was affectionate, kind and industrious while he lived at home, getting in no trouble. Ed also helped to support her. No cross examination was made.

THE STANDARD IS GOOD.

Expert Opinion on Property Owned by Pendleton People.

H. A. Reese, a mining man from Cripple Creek, in company with Dr. Ed W. Mueller, general manager of the Standard Consolidated Gold Mines Company, J. A. McLaughlin, of Lincoln, Neb., secretary of the Killen, Warner, Stewart Company, visited the Standard this week at the request of Eastern capitalists for the purpose of investigating and reporting for them. Mr. Reese says to the Sumpter Miner:

"I regard this as one of the exceedingly meritorious properties of the district. The veins open up strong, are highly mineralized and the samples which I obtained carry uniformly satisfactory values. The apparent strike of the veins shown, leads to the conclusion that they converge near the apex of the hill on the Standard property. I also examined the crossveins from which I took samples. These were exposed and seem fully as strong and as well defined as the other veins. I regard the Jumper vein which has been but slightly opened up near the surface as one of the strong ledges of the group, and will, in my opinion, prove equal to the others."


Postal Clerks at Springfield.

Springfield, Ill., May 30.—Delegates from all the large cities of the state are attending the third annual convention of the Illinois Association of Postal Clerks, in session here today with President Elmer Ott presiding. The business of the convention consists chiefly of the discussion of legislation to be introduced at the next session of congress in behalf of the clerks, the election of new officers and the selection of next year's meeting place. Liberal entertainment has been provided for the visitors by the clerks of the local postoffice.

Have Ticket.

Ohio Socialists to Have Ticket. Columbus, O., May 30.—The convention of the Ohio socialists is in session here today for the nomination of a state ticket and the adoption of a platform, is one of the largest gatherings ever held by the party in this state. The roll call develops the fact that nearly a score of counties were represented by accredited delegates and in addition there were many visitors present. The name of Mark Wild is prominently mentioned in connection with the gubernatorial nomination.
