# NOTES FROM ECHO PROGRAM AGENCY

VERY SUCCESSFUL YEAR FOR THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Believed That an Increase in the Teaching Force Will Be Necessary Next Year—The Money is in Sight for the Canning Plant.

Echo, May 30.—The closing exercises of the Echo schools at the E. church last night was a matter of absorbing interest. The church was packed to overflowing and many could not get inside at all. The program consisted of songs, recitations, drills, dialogues and readings, in which the children acquitted themselves very creditably.

**Successful School Year at Echo.**  
The school year which has just closed here, has, under the direction of Miss Francella Duncan, been a very successful one. The total registration is 76, with an average attendance of 66. Each and all the grades are doing good work.

Miss Duncan has been in the schools here for three years and the place has been tendered her for next year, but she has not yet accepted it. She was assisted for seven months of the past year by Miss Moorhouse, and it is thought that three teachers will be required for the next term.

Yesterday and today were very warm days and garden truck and alfalfa are growing very rapidly. A few more days of such weather will start the haying in earnest.

D. C. Brownell took yesterday evening's train for Pendleton. He says there will be an immense hay harvest on Butter creek, and that there is great demand for hay. Some 300 tons have already been sold. The price offered is \$5.

Umatilla Agency School Best Reservation School in United States—Miss M. V. Gaither, Assistant Superintendent for 10 Years.

The Umatilla Indian school will give an entertainment at the agency next Thursday evening, to which the public is cordially invited.

The entertainment is given on the occasion of the close of the school year at the agency and the following program will be rendered:

The Umatilla Indian school has grown to be the very best reservation school in the Indian service, under the able and efficient management of Miss M. V. Gaither, who has occupied the position of assistant superintendent for the past 10 years.

The great progress made by the pupils in the Umatilla Indian school is one of the most remarkable objects lessons in the education of the savage that has ever been presented to the people of Eastern Oregon.

The principal teacher at the school is Miss Hattie M. McDowell, who has been connected with the institution for the past eight years and is one of the most efficient teachers in the Indian school service in the United States. To Miss McDowell and Miss Gertrude M. Golden, primary teacher, is due much of the credit of the preparation for this entertainment. They have been drilling their little "sunflowers" constantly for weeks, and the program promises to be interesting, instructive and unique. I. R. Bamber, industrial teacher and drill master, has had charge of the military drills that will be presented.

### GENERAL NEWS.

Fifty more militiamen with a Hotchkiss gun and full equipment, have been added to the force of state troops already at Jackson, Ky.

Bombardment of the skies by cannon is to be used near Ottawa, Ontario, to induce rain. The situation is very alarming on account of forest fires and drought.

Representative Payne, of New York, chairman of the house committee on ways and means, declares that the next session of congress will not touch either the tariff or trust questions.

Frank Emmett, a New Orleans cotton broker, lately retired and wealthy, cut his throat with a pen-knife and died. He had worked so hard to accumulate his fortune that his mind had given way.

Dynamite and cotton and waste soaked with oil, have been found in the basement of the Adventist sanitarium at Battle Creek, Mich., confirming rumors that an attempt would be made to destroy the institution.

The row in the Philippines over the friars has resolved itself into a question of replacing the Spanish priesthood with clergymen from America. The pope favors the change, but the Spanish influence is tremendous and hard to loosen.

The floods now devastating Eastern and Central Kansas are the greatest calamity that has ever befallen the state. No flood the state has ever before experienced has come within 15 feet of reaching the level the waters have already reached.

Russia stands firm in her Manchurian policy; so much so, that it is believed in some circles that she will not tolerate the all-round open commercial door. There are indications that Great Britain and Japan will combine to break the commercial blockade.

Robert E. Saltmarsh, an Oregon pioneer, died at The Dalles Sunday, aged 46.

A new oil burner steamer is now being built at the Hoquiam, Wash., ship yards.

Over 30 tons of mail for Dawson is now lying stored in the postoffice at Vancouver, B. C.

Raymond Turnbridge, aged 10, of Ashland, died Sunday of lockjaw, caused by a shot from a toy pistol.

Ed Spencer, who killed Ella Mundt in Spokane, last January, has been found guilty of murder in the second degree.

Mrs. T. G. Tolle, a patient in the insane asylum from Marion county, committed suicide Saturday by setting fire to her clothing.

The postoffice department is investigating the mysterious disappearance of two registered packages from the Baker City postoffice.

The timber commissioner of Washington, has appointed 20 special deputies to patrol the forests during the dry season, to prevent fires.

The decomposed body of Zaccari Rossi, a Swiss timberman, who perished in the forest fire last September, was found near Hoquiam, Sunday.

The Cypress Lawn cemetery of San Francisco, is being boycotted by the Federal Labor Council, because of the discharge of members of the Cemetery Workers' Union.

John R. Kissinger, of Elma, Wash., who enlisted in the 157th Indiana volunteers at the beginning of the Spanish-American war, was the first man to submit to the yellow fever inoculation from a mosquito in the experiments made during the war.
