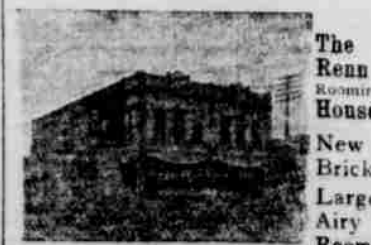

GENERAL NEWS.

The government of Chile is trying to borrow \$5,000,000 in New York City.

British, German and Swedish scientific exploration parties are lost in the Antarctic regions.

The month of May just ended was the driest in the history of New York City, and within one degree of the hottest.

There is rebellion in French Indo-China, where French troops and garrison towns are surrounded by superior numbers of Chinese and are in great danger.

Johann Most, the famous anarchist, in a speech at Chicago, advised his audience to uphold the flag and the constitution of the United States and refrain from violence.

A prisoner—George L. Tyndall—at San Quentin, Cal., suicided by jumping 60 feet off a balcony. He was badly crushed and died without regaining consciousness.

A condition of wage slavery prevails in Porto Rico from a great surplus of labor and extortionate system of store checks, by which merchants realize 40 per cent profits off the poorer classes.

Rev. David Gregg, of New York, argues from the text, "Has the Civil War Settled Anything?" that many of the results of the war are liable to be lost by the reactionary tendency of the times.

The mill of the Lady Smith Lumber Company of Nantiamo, B. C., was destroyed by fire Monday, loss \$25,000.

Mrs. T. G. Tolle, who committed suicide at Salem Monday, had a mania for suicide and had tried twice before.

Several passengers arrived over the Northern Pacific at Tacoma, Monday, suffering from fully developed cases of the measles.

The gamblers of North Yakima have all packed up their goods, games and equipment and left town, since the new gambling law has gone into force.

The fish and game commission of Oregon has 60,000 young trout on hand which will be distributed to the lakes and streams during the month of June. Most of them will go to Columbia and Clackamas counties.

The body of B. F. Egan, the Great Northern superintendent, who was lost last November, while on a deer hunt, near Kalspel, Mont., was found Monday near Five Lakes, not far from where he was last seen alive.
