Apportionment Considerably Smaller Than Was Expected it Would Be.

The Oregon Fish and Game Association has at last got 60,000 trout ready for distribution in the streams of Oregon, and Umatilla county will soon have her share of the little fish with which to stock the streams and lakes of the eastern section.

The game association was to have shipped the trout the last of May. and there were to have been about 400,000 of them, but owing to the floods and various reasons, the ship-ment has dwindled to 60,000.
