IN CIRCUIT COURT

CASE OF GILLILAND VS. WADE IS SETTLED.

Brother of Weston Will Be Brought Here as Witness—Simpson vs. Nelson Being Tried Today. The jury in the case of T. P. Gilliland vs. E. T. Wade today brought in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff, awarding him \$25. The jury was out from 2:30 yesterday afternoon until 10:30 this morning, and the verdict is in the nature of a compromise, the suit being for \$100.

The case of E. Simpson vs. J. A. Nelson, involving the sale of a span of horses, is being tried this afternoon before a jury composed of C. F. Colesworthy, Robert Ferris, Higley Harris, F. P. DeFreese, W. R. Reeder, Thomas Campbell, Joseph Dunn, W. H. Fowler, Fred Webber, J. H. Ferguson and J. J. McConnell. The plaintiff is represented by Carter & Raley and the defendant by Bailey & Lowell.

The case of the state of Oregon vs. Ed Weston, is set for tomorrow, and will be a hotly contested trial. It is an action alleging the larceny of a horse by the defendant. Sheriff T. D. Taylor went to Salem Monday after the brother of the defendant—G. L. Weston, who is serving a sentence on a similar charge, and who is wanted here as a witness in the trial of his brother. The sheriff will return this afternoon with the witness.

DIED OF PERITONITIS.

Florence Inez Gordon Passed Away This Morning. Florence Inez Gordon, the daughter of David Gordon, of this city, died at the St. Joseph hospital this morning at 4:15 o'clock, aged 13 years and 5 months, from general peritonitis. The child was operated upon by Drs. Smith and Cole for appendicitis, but the case was of too long standing and the disease could not be checked. The funeral will be held from the family home 711 Willow street, at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

MEMORIAL SERVICES.

Woodmen and Women of Woodcraft Annual Observance. Pendleton Camp 141, Woodmen of the World, and Daphne Circle No. 2, will hold their unveiling and memorial services on Sunday afternoon next at 4 o'clock. The two lodges will meet at their hall at 3:30 in the afternoon and at 4 o'clock sharp will march to the cemetery, where the ceremonies will be held. Robert Cronin will deliver the address of the day, and will speak along fraternal lines, touching also upon the symbolism and beauty of the unveiling of monuments for the fraternal dead. There are two monuments to be unveiled this year, one by each lodge. The Pendleton camp mourns the loss of Samuel Hays, deceased during the last year, while the Daphne Circle will unveil a monument in memory of Mrs. Arthur Gibson. It is a custom of the Woodmen to hold memorial services for their dead on the Sunday following Memorial day, and upon this day the monuments are unveiled. The services next Sunday are in accordance with this custom.

ATHENA GUN CLUB MEET.

Will Be Attended Friday and Saturday by Several From Pendleton. The Athena Gun Club will hold its open tournament at Athena on Friday and Saturday of this week. Pendleton will send a delegation to compete for the honors and prizes offered, and among those going are J. M. Spence, F. W. Waite, S. B. Thompson, W. J. Sewell, T. W. Ayres, J. D. Tallman, D. C. Clark, Otto Boettcher and H. J. Stillman. Messrs. Ayres and Tallman, Boettcher and Clark will perhaps go one day each, as they cannot both leave their business at the same time. Others of Pendleton's sportsmen may also attend, but as yet they have not made known their intentions. A delegation of visitors from this place will also attend, though not to participate.

FISH DISTRIBUTION.

Apportionment Considerably Smaller Than Was Expected It Would Be. The Oregon Fish and Game Association has at last got 60,000 trout ready for distribution in the streams of Oregon, and Umatilla county will soon have her share of the little fish with which to stock the streams and lakes of the eastern section. The game association was to have shipped the trout the last of May, and there were to have been about 400,000 of them, but owing to the floods and various reasons, the shipment has dwindled to 60,000. The shipment will be made as soon as permission is received from the state board, and the fish will be planted in the upper Umatilla, Meacham creek, the North fork of Meacham, McKay, Birch and Butler creeks, and the Walla Walla river in the vicinity of Milton. The car containing the shipment will be under the supervision of the hatchery men and will unload at this place the fish apportioned to McKay and Birch creeks. The others will
