IN THE BAHAMA ISLANDS.

Government Commission Will Scientifically Explore Them. Baltimore, Md., June 5.—A scientific expedition to the Bahama Islands will leave Baltimore tomorrow on the steamer H. W. Vonname. The expedition will be under the direction of Dr. George B. Shattuck, associate professor of geology of the Johns Hopkins University.

The government has appointed expert workers from the soil and fish commission to accompany the expedition; the history of the islands will be studied, with their commercial geography and banking system. A special study will also be made of atmospheric conditions and the sea atmosphere. A new beach mark will also be fixed to show the recession of the tide.

The expedition is one of the most thoroughly equipped that has ever been sent out, since all branches of science are represented, and the value of its work will be the greater in that very little literature exists regarding this portion of the world's surface, nor has it been written up scientifically to any great extent. It is expected that the work will occupy two months' time.

CREDIT MEN IN SESSION.

National Convention Being Held Today in St. Louis.

St. Louis, June 5.—Arrangements on an extensive scale are being made for the eighth annual convention of the National Credit Men's Association to be held in this city next week. The association has made a large increase in its membership during the last year and the attendance at the coming meeting will undoubtedly be the largest in the history of the organization.

J. H. Tregoe, of Baltimore, is the president of the association and will preside over the coming convention. The other officers of the association are George J. Puffer, of Detroit, vice-president, and Wm. A. Prendergast, of New York, secretary and treasurer.

Princeton, N. J., June 5.—The 156th annual commencement week at Princeton University was ushered in this afternoon with the annual golf match between graduates and undergraduates. Tomorrow the annual junior oratorical contest will take place in Alexander Hall and in the afternoon Princeton and Yale will meet on the diamond. In the evening the seniors will sing on the steps of "Old North," and later there will be a concert by the Glee Club.

Des Moines, Ia., June 5.—The annual camp meeting of the National Holiness Association opened today at Midland Chautauqua Park. The session was presided over by Rev. C. J. Fowler, of Haverhill, Mass., president of the national association. The meeting was devoted to prayers and experience talks. The sessions will continue for 10 days, and eminent speakers from Illinois, Kentucky, Texas, Missouri and other states have agreed to be present.
