MISIONARY ALLIANCE.

Five States Represented in the Convention in Session Today. Indianapolis, Ind., June 6.—The fifth

annual convention of the Christian and Missionary Alliance for the district of Indiana, Michigan, Western Kentucky and Missouri opens in this city this evening and many delegates have arrived to participate in the proceedings. The sessions are to continue through the whole of next week.

GERMAN CATHOLICS OF OHIO.

Important Meeting of an Influential Organization.

Cincinnati, O., June 6.—Many visitors are arriving for the fifth state convention of the Ohio Staatsverband and from all indications the gathering will be the largest ever held by the German Catholic societies of the state of Ohio.

The celebrations connected with the convention will begin tomorrow morning with solemn high mass at Holy Trinity church. In the afternoon the delegates and the German Catholic societies of this vicinity will participate in the solemn dedication of the new banner of the St. Bernard's Benevolent Society, and all will attend vespers and benediction at Holy Trinity church. The business sessions will occupy Monday and Tuesday.

The Ohio Staatsverband is affiliated with the German Roman Catholic Central Verein, and is as present composed of about 65 societies, having a combined membership of nearly 7,000.

At Sir John's Grave.

Kingston, Ont., June 6.—This being the twelfth anniversary of the death of Sir John A. MacDonald, members of the Kingston MacDonald Club and delegations of prominent conservatives this afternoon drove to Cataragui cemetery, and decorated the grave of the deceased statesman. Each association placed handsome wreaths made of white carnations, pink roses and sweet peas on the grave. Several memorial addresses were delivered, the speakers paying a touching tribute to the illustrious dead, and referring to him as the greatest among Canadians, and one whose influence yet lived.
