WORLD'S W. C. T. U.

LARGE ATENDANCE AT GENEVA, SWITZERLAND.

Delegates From All Parts of the Civilized World—Every Country's Representation Equal to That of Any Previous Convention and Some Are Larger.

Geneva, Switzerland, June 8.—American women, English women, French women and women of many other nationalities who have devoted their lives and best energies to the temperance cause have gathered on the shores of Lake Lemman to take part in the sixth biennial convention of the World's Women's Christian Temperance Union. The gathering will formally be opened here tomorrow and the sessions will continue for several days.

The large number and representative character of the delegates constitute a refutation of the report that has gained some currency to the effect that with the passing away or retirement of the founders and pioneer workers of the organization the W. C. T. U. has been losing ground.

From all appearances the present convention will be by far a larger and more notable gathering than the convention held two years ago at Edinburgh. The United States and Canada have sent a number of prominent workers, while the representation of England, the Scandinavian countries and Australia equals that at previous conventions of the organization.

Increased Attendance.

With the present convention Lady Somerset is to retire from active participation in the affairs of the W. C. T. U. In future she will devote her time and attention exclusively to the management of the home for invalids which she has founded in England to the numerous other charities in which she is interested. Considerable interest attaches to the choice of her successor in the presidency of the World's W. C. T. U.

KANSAS AND ART.

Objection Raised to the Artistic Idea in Kansas.

The sculpture to represent "Kansas" in a group at the St. Louis exposition, shows a half nude woman with one arm thrown over the head of a bull.

The woman has no clothes on, except a drapery across her knees, and a handkerchief wound around her forehead. The former might be a bathrobe, but the latter looks as if she had just finished dusting and sat down to rest.

But she has a sickle in one hand, and Kansas women don't use them to dust with. And there is the bull. A bull doesn't belong to a parlor scene. We never saw a half-naked woman sitting with one arm over a bull crouched beside her, and we have lived in the state 25 years. Bulls are not that tame. If it had been a cow, on her feet, with a milking bucket under her, it would have been more like the woman's feet are bare, except for a pair of sandals. Our women don't hang around fierce bulls in such attire, but, on the contrary, run from them.

If the artists insist upon a bull, then he should have a full-dressed woman holding up her skirts and running for dear life for a fence.

We don't understand art; we are glad, when we see what is to represent "Kansas," that we don't.—Atchison Globe.

QUITE OPTIMISTIC.

Chicago Bank Officials Declare That Conditions Are Excellent.

Chicago, June 8.—Local bank officials generally speaking say that there is nothing alarming for the general business conditions of the country in the present state of the stock market. Many of them believe that the tendency of inflated securities to get back to the normal level will eventually result in much good to the country's affairs in general.

Some of these bankers have devoted much time to the study of the situation and they feel that everything is working for the better and that the present condition of the stock market will serve ultimately to establish a proper level of prices for all securities.

It is roughly estimated by a well posted dry goods advertising man that New York dry goods merchants spend together for advertising in excess of \$5,000,000 each year. Chicago over \$3,000,000. Philadelphia between \$1,300,000 and \$1,400,000. St. Louis, Pittsburg, Cleveland, Buffalo and Cincinnati each nearly \$1,000,000.
