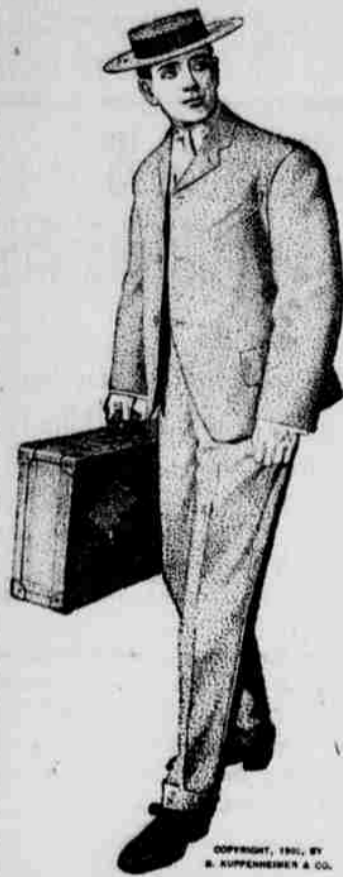

## NEWS OF TUTUILLA

FOUR THOUSAND DOLLAR SALE OF BEEF CATTLE.

Close of Tutuilla Academy for the Year—Barley Harvest Will Be Early—Nineteen Hundred Pounds of Fish in One Haul—Rain Is Needed Around Juniper.

Jack French last week sold \$4,000 worth of beef cattle to a Seattle firm.

W. H. Habb, who is up from Echo, has a crop of barley nearly matured, which will be ready for the headers in a week.

Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Gillett, former residents of Tutuilla, are down from Moscow, Idaho, on a visit. M. H. brought with him half a dozen mules for the Umatilla county market.

William Gillett returned yesterday from Cathlamet, where he has been putting in spools for fishermen to draw their nets ashore with. The fishermen are having a rich harvest Mr. Gillett saw one net hauled ashore containing 1,900 pounds of fish. He goes down again on Wednesday to put in some more spools and will bring back a new threshing machine from Portland to be ready for harvest.

Jack Lawson returned last week from a year's sojourn at his old home in Illinois. On his westward trip he crossed a part of the flooded district, where the Father of Waters is causing so much destruction of property and distress to people. The high ground back from the river is covered with a city of tents, in which the unfortunate residents of that section are finding temporary shelter.

**WOOL SALE AT CANYON CITY.**  
A Large Amount of Wool Is Collected at That Point.

Canyon City, June 9.—Malheur county's wool product is rolling into the wool warehouses in this city at a rapid rate. 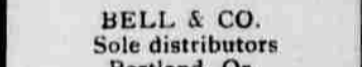

### GENERAL NEWS.

King Leopold of Belgium is contemplating a visit to the United States.

Owing to the stagnation of the iron industry in Austria, large numbers of workmen are emigrating to America.

A merry-go-round ran away with itself in Chicago, badly injuring several children who were riding on it. One or more of the injured children are not expected to live.

Ex-Senator George Turner has secured options on the Standard and the Mammoth silver-lead mines in the Coeur d'Alenes, on the basis, it is understood, of about \$5,000,000 for the two properties. His option will expire on August 18.

A feature of the World's Fair will be a pottery in operation. Workmen of the highest skill will manufacture pottery so that visitors may note all the processes involved. A firing furnace will stand in the center of a special building and the potters with their wheels will be so arranged around the interior so that visitors may make a clear inspection of the work.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

Portland and Oregon City are going thro' a hold-up epidemic.

The Mazamas are preparing to make the ascent of the Three Sisters.

S. B. Hoeninghaus has been arrested at Salem for passing worthless checks.

Tacoma is stirred up over the impure milk and adulterated food being served in its restaurants.

James Townsend was torn to pieces by a log coming down the chute in a logging camp near Vancouver, B. C.

Bremerton has revoked the licenses of the saloons near the navy yard, which caused the navy department to boycott that point.

Monday forenoon the 2-year-old son of George Allen, of La Grande, drank part of a bottle of iodine. Prompt work saved the child's life.

Roscoe Carns, of Baker City, was shot in the leg by a friend who "didn't know the gun was loaded." He may have to lose his leg.

The last of the smallpox suspects is out of quarantine at Prineville, both hotels there are doing business again and people are rapidly forgetting the late unpleasantness.

British Columbia's parliament has just closed, much to the relief of the British Columbia public. It passed many unpopular acts and saddled \$5,000,000 of debts on the country.

The postal inspectors who have been investigating the theft of a registered package containing \$450, at the Baker City postoffice, have required the postmaster to make good the loss.

### Brooklyn in Commission.

New York, June 9.—At the Brooklyn navy yard today the armored cruiser Brooklyn was placed in commission in pursuance of orders from Washington. The Brooklyn, it is understood, will be the flagship of Rear Admiral Cotton, commanding the European naval station. She will relieve the cruiser Chicago, which will return home for repairs.

### WATER FAMINE IS RELIEVED.

Lewiston City Council Purchases a New Pump.

Lewiston, Idaho, June 9.—Water was turned on at noon Sunday after having been shut off 12 hours while new lining was being put in the cylinder of the pump at the city water works. It is expected that the pump will now handle 60 per cent more water. The city council has also purchased a mining pump formerly in use at Salem Bar placer mines, 30 miles above here in the Snake river. A crew of men left here to take the pump down and haul it to the boat landing.

Arrangements have been perfected with the O. R. & N. Co., for the steamer Lewiston to go to Salem Bar Friday next and get the pump. The new pump will be placed at Harrington or Small & Emery's mill and pump directly into the city water mains. The pump has a capacity of 20,000 gallons an hour. Its use will permit the moderate use of water for irrigation. There is some talk among councilmen that the present contract with the Eastern firm for the delivery of a heavy pump, which was to have been delivered here by May 1, should be cancelled. Action on this effect may be taken at the next meeting of the council.

### NEW COLLEGE PRESIDENT.

Professor Kelly is a Famous Expert in Psychology.

Richmond, Ind., June 8.—President Robert L. Kelly was formally installed as head of Earlham College today in the presence of a large audience, including trustees, faculty, alumni, students and friends of the college. Leading educators were in attendance from nearly all of the prominent colleges and universities of Indiana and there were also eminent representatives of the Friends' institutions of learning in various parts of the country. The particular features of the inaugural program were the installation address, delivered by President Harper, of the University of Chicago, and the inaugural address of President Kelly. Brief congratulatory addresses were delivered on behalf of the student body, the alumni and the educational institutions of Indiana.

### Biographical Sketch.

Robert L. Kelly, the new president of Earlham College, graduated from that university in 1888. He did three years of graduate work in psychology at the University of Chicago, where he took the master's degree and for three years in succession was awarded a fellowship. In Chicago he conducted extensive investigation in the field of child psychology, both of the normal and abnormal type, in which line he is recognized as an authority. He came to Earlham College two years ago from Penn College, Iowa, of which institution he was acting president.
