NEWS OF MILTON

SUCCESSFUL OPERETTA GIVEN BY MILTON TALENT.

Sixteen Graduates This Year From Columbia College—Commencement Was Followed by a Banquet—A Quarantined Case of Scarlet Fever—Interesting Collection of General Neighborhood News.

Milton, June 10.—Commencement exercises of Columbia College were held Monday and Tuesday evenings. Many assembled in the new opera house hall, which was beautifully decorated with flowers and bunting of the college colors, red and yellow.

At the close of the program Monday evening, which consisted of music and contests in oratory and elocution, an operetta, entitled "The Fairies of the Season," was given by a fairy queen, attended by two elf pages and 16 young ladies dressed in costumes to represent the four seasons. It was well rendered and received by an appreciative audience.

On Tuesday evening Dr. W. B. Reese, of Lewiston, Idaho, delivered the address to the graduating class, which consisted of 16 boys and girls, eight of whom finished the academic course and six the business course. The diplomas were presented by Professor W. C. Howard, president of the college.

Medals were received by James Briley for the best oration, Paine Shangle for elocution and Ida Stora for the highest number of credits obtained throughout the year.

After the exercises Tuesday evening a banquet was given the faculty of the college and the graduates.

BUSINESS ON A SOUND BASIS.

Prominent Financiers Are Optimistic and See No Danger.

New York, June 11.—Interviews obtained this week with prominent leaders in various lines of business, tend to indicate healthy trade conditions generally throughout the country. In some lines business is not as good as it was for two reasons—the approach of the dull season and the uneasiness resulting from uncertain labor conditions. These serve, the business men say, as a balance wheel for commerce. They encourage a conservatism that is distinctly healthy.

Influence of Crop Movements.

Hope for increased trade and a stronger financial situation seems based on the movement of the crops. This once accomplished and the return flow of currency from the interior under way, marked improvement is predicted in all lines of trade, and in financial circles.

It is declared this is a healthy period of adjustment. Undigested securities are being digested. No signs are observed to indicate that the limit of development has been reached. Outward indications are abundant that the purchasing power is increasing every year. The general sentiment seems to be that the country is in a sound financial condition.

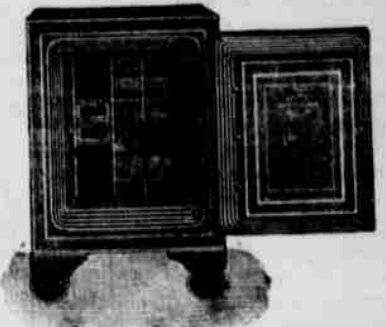

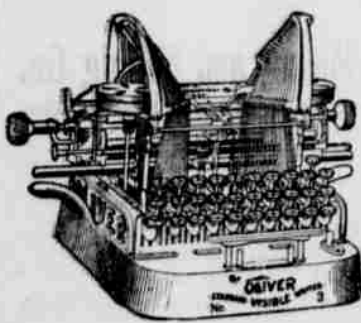
