### GERMANY FORBIDS PLAGUE EXPERIMENTS.

Too Great a Risk to Those Who Conduct the Experiments.

Berlin, June 11.—In consequence of the death from plague at the Berlin hospital of the young Vienna physician, Dr. Milan Sachs, the government has decided to issue a decree forbidding further experiments with plague germs, the risk of spreading infection being considered more dangerous to the public health than the knowledge gained in studying a deadly microbe justifies.

Dr. Sachs caught the plague in Dr. Koch's bacteriological laboratory for infectious diseases. The laboratory is isolated and the most minute precautions are taken at the doors and windows to prevent the escape of the germs. No one is allowed to approach or enter the building except the investigators. The decree

forbidding the further experiments was determined upon at a conference yesterday at the ministry of education of the sanitary and police authorities, in which the emperor's physician, Dr. Leuthod, Professor Renvers and other noted specialists participated. Dr. Sachs was sent here by the Austrian government, who intended to use his services in perfecting the sanitary arrangements in Bukowina.

### IN OLD VIRGINIA.

Celebration in Honor of Famous Roanoke College.

Salem, Va., June 11.—The semi-centennial celebration of Roanoke College culminated today in the annual commencement exercises. President J. D. Dreher, delivered the diploma and the address to the graduating class was made by Governor A. J. Montague of Virginia. At the con-

clusion of the exercises there was a reception in honor of Governor Montague, attended by students, members of the faculty, alumni and friends of the college.

The past week, which has witnessed the dedication of several new college buildings as well as the graduation of an unusually large class, is regarded by all concerned as one of the most notable periods in the history of the institution.
