The Wheat Trade,

Portland, June 11.-There is pleny of wheat at tide water warehouses for a number of more ships, but this will no doubt go over into the new Quotations rule for club blue stem 77c, valley 76c per bushel Sellers have no difficulty in obtain ing these figures, but stocks in sell ers hands are very small, as nearly all the wheat remaining in the coun-try belongs to exporters and millers. A few parcels can still be had, but the owners want more money than the same is worth.

Crop advices during the past week were very favorable and a general improvement has been noted. Good rains have come in the principal wheat growing sections, and corres-pondents all report the outlook much better. Some sections of Washington need a little more rain, but the majority of the counties are in good

condition.

Flour-There is a good demand at present for flour, and a great many of the mills that were closed down some few weeks back have resumed perations. The demand rincipally from Japan. operations. California seing very short of wheat, cannot ship very much over to Japan. other sections of the globe there is so demand. The outlook is very couraging for a good trade this fall, as stocks are low in other importing countries. A very large cargo left Portland last Friday to various ports on the steamer Indraveili. She had on board over 48,000 barrels, destin-

ed to China, Japan and Siberia,
