MASONS IN SESSION

GRAND LODGE WILL END ITS WORK TONIGHT.

List of Officers Elected—Not Much Business to Transact—Shriners Will Meet Saturday Evening.

Portland, June 12.—The grand lodge, A. F. and A. M. of Oregon, elected the following officers at the session yesterday afternoon:

S. M. Moran, of Eugene, grand master; Thomas Gray, of Portland, deputy grand master; W. H. Flanagan, Grant's Pass, grand senior warden; W. T. Williamson, Salem, grand junior warden; Henry Roe, Portland, grand treasurer; James F. Robinson, Eugene, grand secretary; Jacob Mayer, Portland, M. S. Woodcock, Corvallis, John B. Cleland, Portland, trustees of educational fund. The other grand lodge officers are appointive and will be named by the grand master.

The election of Mr. Robinson as grand secretary is a mark of confidence. He has served in the same capacity for the grand lodge for more than eight years and has served in a similar capacity for other Masonic bodies even longer.

The new grand master, S. M. Moran, has come up through the stations from junior warden and is one of the best-known Masons in the state. Precedent in Masonic circles favors promotions and his election was a foregone conclusion when the grand lodge met.

The morning session of the grand lodge yesterday was devoted to purely routine business, no questions of general importance being brought up. The address of the retiring grand master showed the lodges of the state are flourishing and the order has made steady advances during the year. The spirit of good fellowship pervades the entire order and the grand master congratulated the members upon the good financial showing the grand lodge could make.

The installation will take place tonight, and the Shriners will hold a meeting Saturday evening, which will close the session of the Masonic bodies now gathered here.

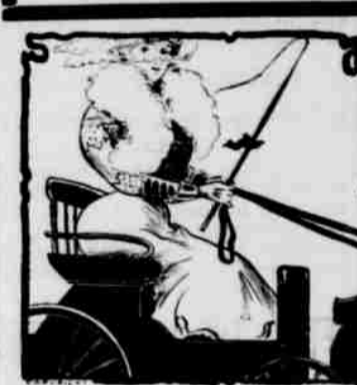

GENERAL NEWS.

Rochester, N. Y., had an \$800,000 fire.

Guillermo, the famous Filipino outlaw, has been captured.

War is imminent between the cattlemen and sheepmen of Southwestern Colorado.

Pope Leo has recuperated sufficiently to celebrate mass on the feast day of Corpus Christi.

Chile is said to be retrogressing in every sense—industrially, commercially and politically.

In April last 1,646,000 tons of pig iron were produced in the United States, in May 1,755,000 tons.

Lady Henry Somerset was re-elected president of the International W. C. T. U. by the recent Geneva convention.

July 4 next will be an all-day holiday for all free rural delivery mail carriers, according to a ruling of the general department.

The bi-centennial of John Wesley's birthday will be generally celebrated by the Methodists everywhere. It occurs June 28, 1903.

The bricklayers of New York City are threatening the first general strike in 30 years. They demand 70 cents per hour and that no bricklayers be employed who do not belong to the union.

Two hundred Cistercian monks are expected to come to the United States this summer as a result of the operation of the anti-congregation laws in France. Most of them will go to Kentucky.

There will be an investigation of the Eppinger Co. failure at San Francisco by the grand jury. It is alleged that large sums of money were borrowed on warehouse grain receipts after the firm knew the grain had been deported.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Canadian Pacific strike is now settled and the train men have returned to work with most of their concessions granted.

North Yakima will vote on a \$40,000 bond for school building purposes. She reports 360 more pupils this year than last.

Horticultural Commissioner Beck, of North Yakima, reports that 150,000 fruit trees have been set out in Yakima county this spring.

Forest fires are now raging in the foothills east of Tacoma and the White River Mill, destroyed last year, is again in danger.

The O. R. & N. advertising department has photographed the Hood River strawberry fields, to be used in a forthcoming descriptive folder.

C. B. West, the O. R. & N. telegraph operator who stabbed J. W. Thomas, a fellow-operator, at Huntington last week, is now in jail at Baker City under \$2,000 bonds.

A Louie, the Canadian Indian who killed his 17-year-old wife at Vancouver, B. C., last April, in a fit of passion, must hang. His appeal to the Dominion government for leniency has been disregarded.

Gambling has been stopped at Spokane and the saloons are all closed in Bremerton. Walla Walla also shut up her gambling halls Thursday and the new anti-game law of Washington is to be rigidly enforced.

Edward L. Naylor, of Forest Grove, sheared one Cotswold buck lamb, 10 months old, whose fleece weighed 16 pounds. The price of that grade of wool is 16 cents per pound, which makes the income on his flock \$256 per head.
