WESTON NORMAL CLOSES.

End of Another Most Successful School Year.

Weston, June 12.—The graduating exercises of the Weston Normal school were held Wednesday night and the most successful school year in the history of the institution was brought to a close with appropriate ceremonies.

Rev. M. H. Marvin, of Walla Walla, delivered the annual address and Miss Stella Anderson of Athena, gave the class valedictory.

The class now graduating set a very commendable precedent by the presentation to the school of Watts' "Sir Galahad," through the class president, Miss Clarissa O'Hara. The picture is an excellent reproduction of the great painting, and bears upon its frame a silver plate upon which are inscribed the names of the graduates, who are: Stella E. Anderson, Bertha E. Long, Ernest E. Walden, Lillian A. Winn, Clarissa O'Hara, George W. Winn, Grace V. Ray, E. Blanche Canfield, Charles L. Holway, Ida I. Marsh, Edna A. Rider, Walter E. Ely.

The diplomas were presented by President Robert C. French, who in his address to the class referred to the rapidly changing conditions of the state and the increasing demands that are being made upon the public school system. The function of the normal school is to open to the young teacher the vast fields of possibilities in the teaching profession, and to stimulate him to a realizing sense of the responsibilities of his work. The class now graduating is one of the most promising that has been sent out of the school for many years.

The attendance afforded gratifying evidence of the interest taken in the school's work. The large chapel hall, which seats 500 people, was crowded and many beautiful floral gifts were received by the class members from admiring relatives and friends.

Commencement closed this evening with the exercises and banquet of the Alumni Association. Ex-President M. G. Royal, of Olympia, Wash., gave the address.

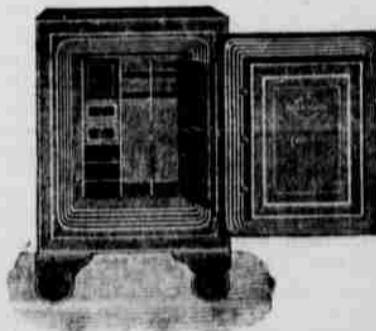

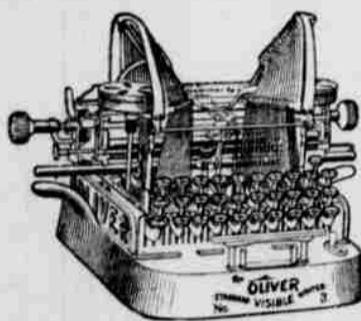
