FAMOUS MAINE SCHOOL.

One Hundred Years Ago Today Hampden Was Founded.

Bangor, Me., June 12.—The centennial anniversary of the founding of Hampden Academy was celebrated today with interesting ceremonies, in which a number of distinguished men took part. An oration was delivered by Justice Lucius A. Emery of the Maine supreme court, and a history of the academy was read by Chaplain David Tribon, of the United States navy.

Hampden Academy was instituted March 7, 1803, and was opened June 12 of that year. The first building, a small wooden structure, was burned in 1840, when the present substantial brick buildings were erected. Many men who afterward became prominent in the affairs of the state and nation were students at the academy.

VERY OLD ACADEMY.

Institution Was Founded One Hundred and Forty Years Ago.

Boston, Mass., June 12.—At Newbury today an interesting celebration was held of the 140th anniversary of the opening of Dunmer Academy, the oldest institution of its kind in the United States. The academy was founded by Lieut. Governor William Dunmer, in 1763, when a small school house was erected, and on March 1, 1763, the academy formally opened, having 28 pupils in attendance at the time and the institution has been ever since in continuous service.
