GENERAL NEWS.

Miss Ella C. Roosevelt, a cousin of President Roosevelt, has been operated upon for appendicitis.

The killing of 60 Bulgarians by Turks—soldiers and privateering Musselmenn—is reported from Yenik.

Two hundred people were drowned at Azoff, Russia, by the collapse of a steamer gangway loaded with excursionists.

All the members of the Russian court profess and express great horror over the assassination of King Alexander and Queen Draga.

The Union Pacific blacksmiths at Cheyenne, have returned to work, after being on strike. They return on a compromise agreement.

Louis Bolin, aged 60, was killed by his step-daughter, who split his head with an axe while he was whipping his step-son, the girl's brother.

Nicaragua and Costa Rica are at loggerheads and may fight. Nicaragua accuses Costa Rica of aiding and abetting the recent rebellion in that country.

The four powder manufacturing concerns in California have been absorbed by the Dupont trust, recently organized in New Jersey with a capital of \$50,000,000.

The jar and shock of an explosion of dynamite in New York caused a barber to give a wild jerk to his right hand and lay open a customer's face for three inches.

Earthquake shocks, terrifying on account of their frequency, rather than because of their violence, continue all along the Acapulcan coast of Mexico and far out at sea.

A man whose name has not been learned, rode for five miles ahead of the flood caused by a cloudburst in Arizona, giving warning to the denizens of the valley. He saved hundreds of lives.

James G. Darden, formerly of Portland, is under arrest at Dallas, Texas, for embezzling funds belonging to an estate.

The Oregon State Fair board is trying to arrange to have Cresceus, the world famous trotting stallion, exhibited at the coming state fair.

A new theater with a seating capacity of 4,000, will be built by the Northwestern Association in Seattle this season. It will be called the Empire Gardens.

Donald McLellan, aged 70, of Tacoma, was struck by a Northern Pacific coal train at Carbonado, Friday. He died of his injuries two hours after the accident.

Trouble between squatters and the Warner Valley Stock Company, in Lake county, is reported. The squatters refuse to vacate and several of their houses have been burned.

British Columbia refuses to admit Japanese from the United States on a new educational standard fixed by the board of immigration and the authorities are in a quandary as to what to do with a boatload now anchored at Seattle.
